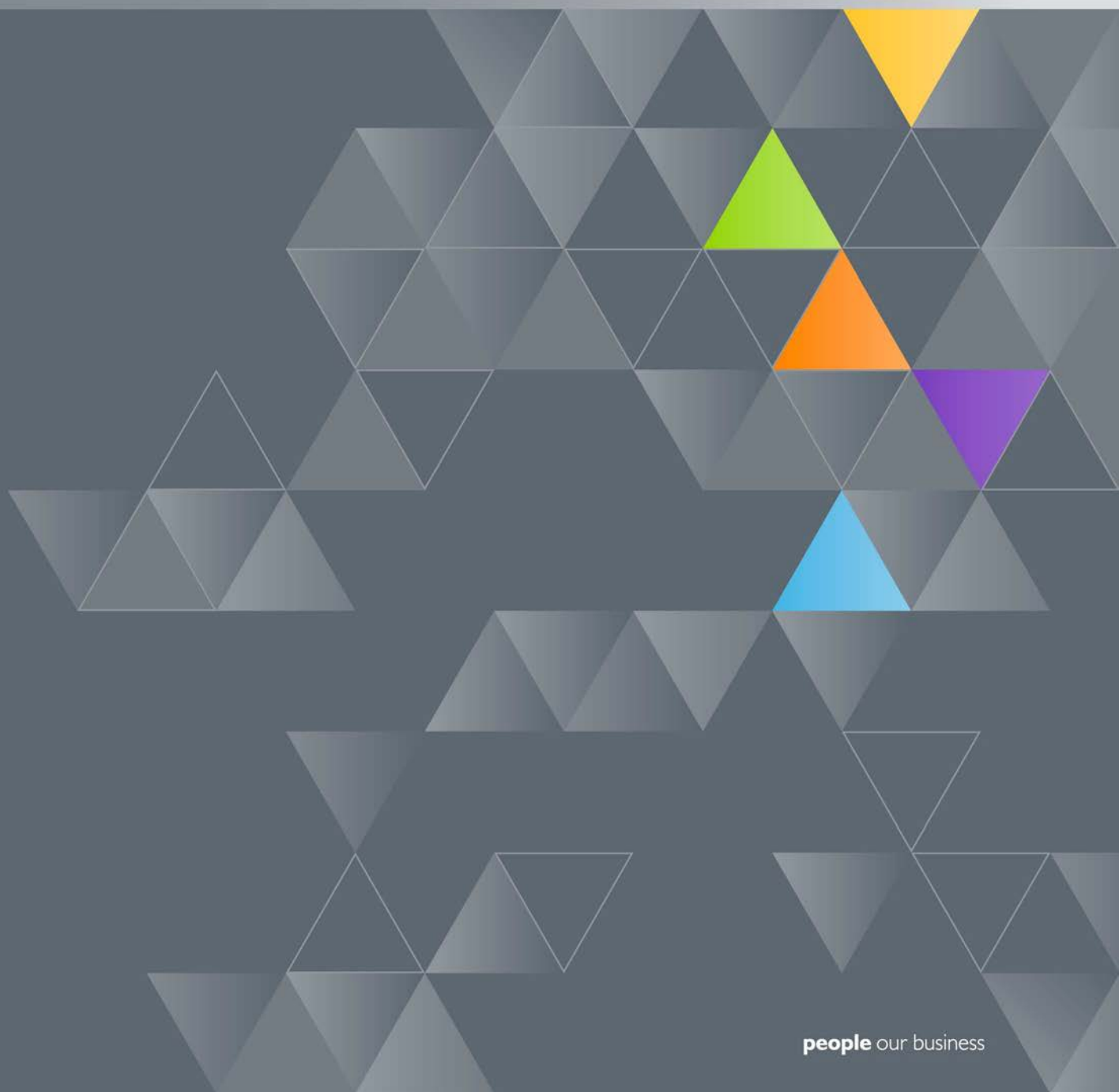

Immigration Detention and Community Statistics Summary

30 June 2014



About this report

This report provides an overview of the number of people in immigration detention and Offshore Processing Centres as at midnight on the date of the report. The report is produced on a monthly basis.

Data is sourced from several departmental processing and recording systems. Data relating to the immigration detention population is dynamic and there can be delays in transmission of information from the department's immigration detention network operations. Variations in figures between this report and previous issues can occur. Due to these issues, data from the current financial year should always be considered provisional.

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Immigration Detention and Community Statistics Summary

As at 30 June 2014, there were 3624 people in immigration detention facilities, including 2547 in immigration detention on the mainland and 1077 in immigration detention on Christmas Island.

A further 3007 people were living in the community after being approved for a residence determination and 24500 were living in the community after grant of a Bridging Visa E.

Community Population by State/Territory

Of the 3007 people approved for a residence determination to live in the community, 41% are in Victoria, 20% in Queensland, 18% in New South Wales, 10% in South Australia, 7% in Western Australia and 2% in Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory.

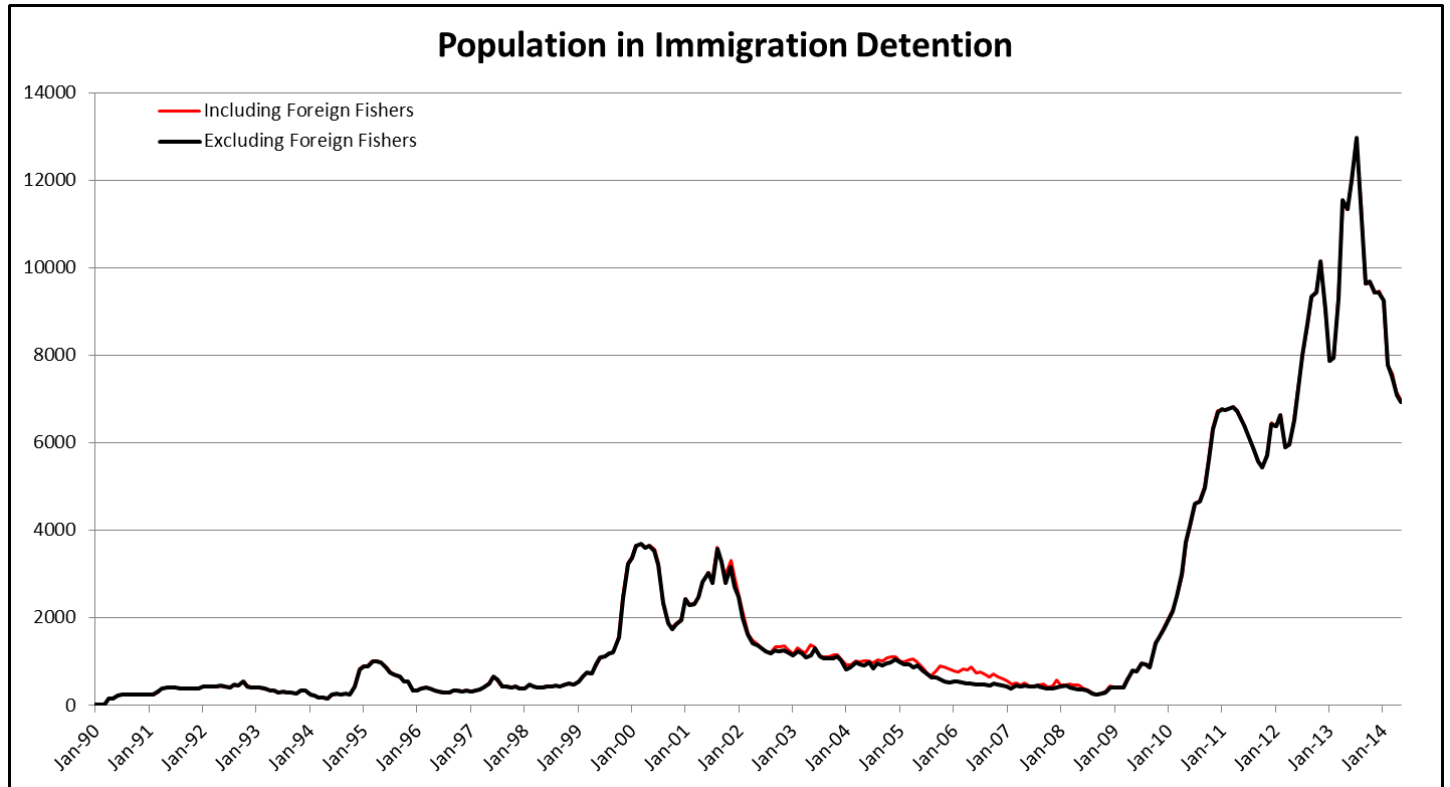

Immigration Detention Population from 1990 to 30 June 2014

The number of people in immigration detention continues to fluctuate month to month, as a result of releases into the community as well as transfers to Offshore Processing Centres.

Figure 1 - Population in Immigration Detention

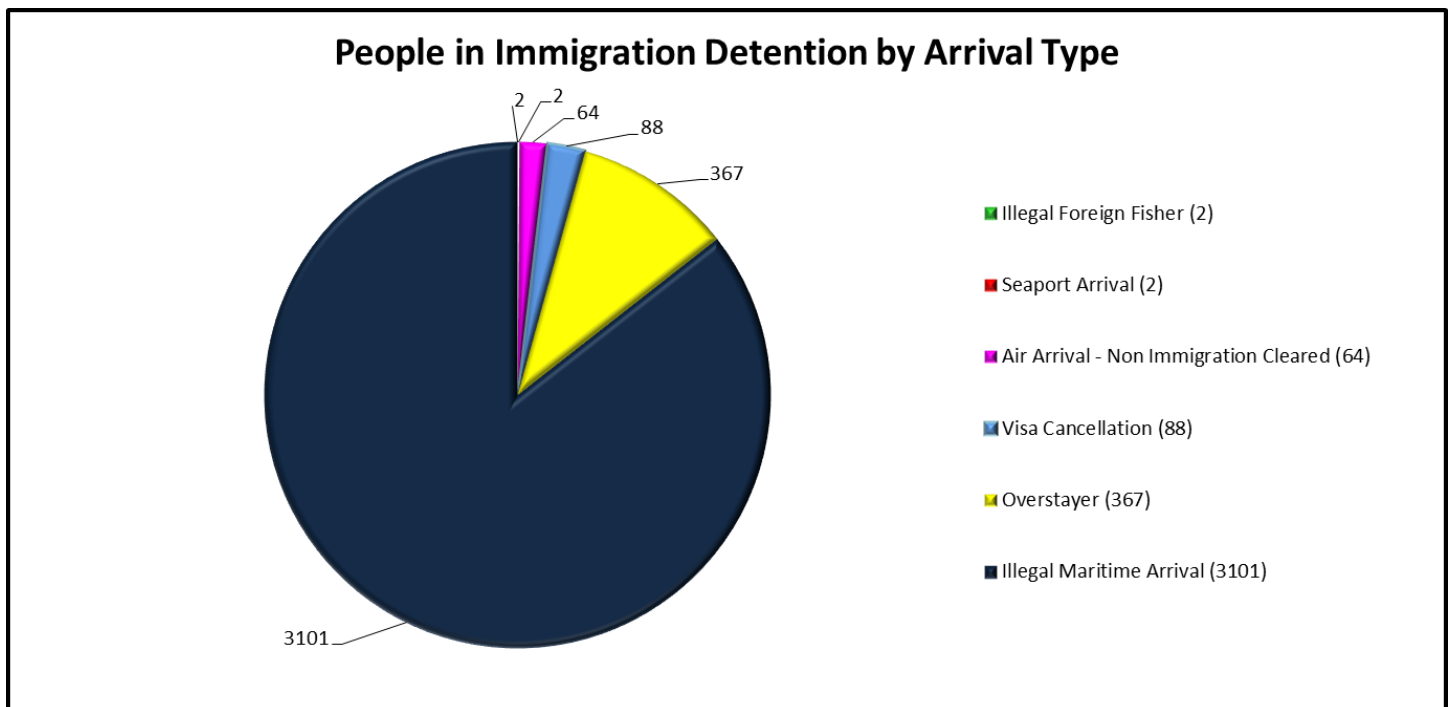


People in Immigration Detention Facilities by Arrival Type

The number of people in immigration detention facilities, who arrived unlawfully by air or boat as at 30 June 2014 was 3169, representing approximately 87% of the total immigration detention facilities population.

There were also 455 people (about 13% of the total immigration population) who arrived in Australia lawfully and were subsequently taken into immigration detention and had visa cancellations for either over staying or breaching their visa conditions.

People in Immigration Detention by Nationality

As at 30 June 2014, there were 3624 people in held immigration detention facilities. Of these 3624 people, around 27% were from Iran, 16% were from Vietnam, 11% were from Stateless, 9% were Sri Lanka and 5% were from Afghanistan.

As at 30 June 2014, 3007 were people living in the community after being approved for a residence determination. Of these 3007 people, around 29% were from Iran, 23% were from Sri Lanka, 14% were Stateless and 11% were from Afghanistan.

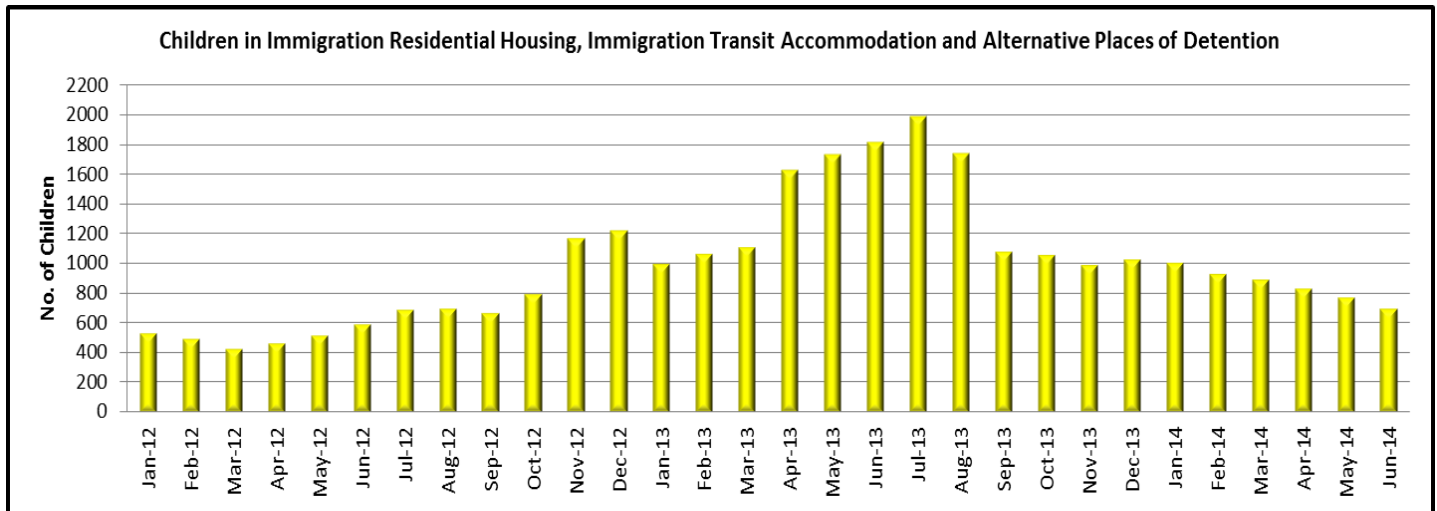

Children in Immigration Detention

As at 30 June 2014, there were 699 children (aged under 18 years) in Immigration Residential Housing, Immigration Transit Accommodation and Alternative Places of Detention.

The number of children in immigration facilities decreased in June as children completed mandatory processing and were transferred into the community or to an Offshore Processing Centre as part of a family group.

The number of children living in the community after being approved for a residence determination slightly increased in June 2014 to 1525 children.

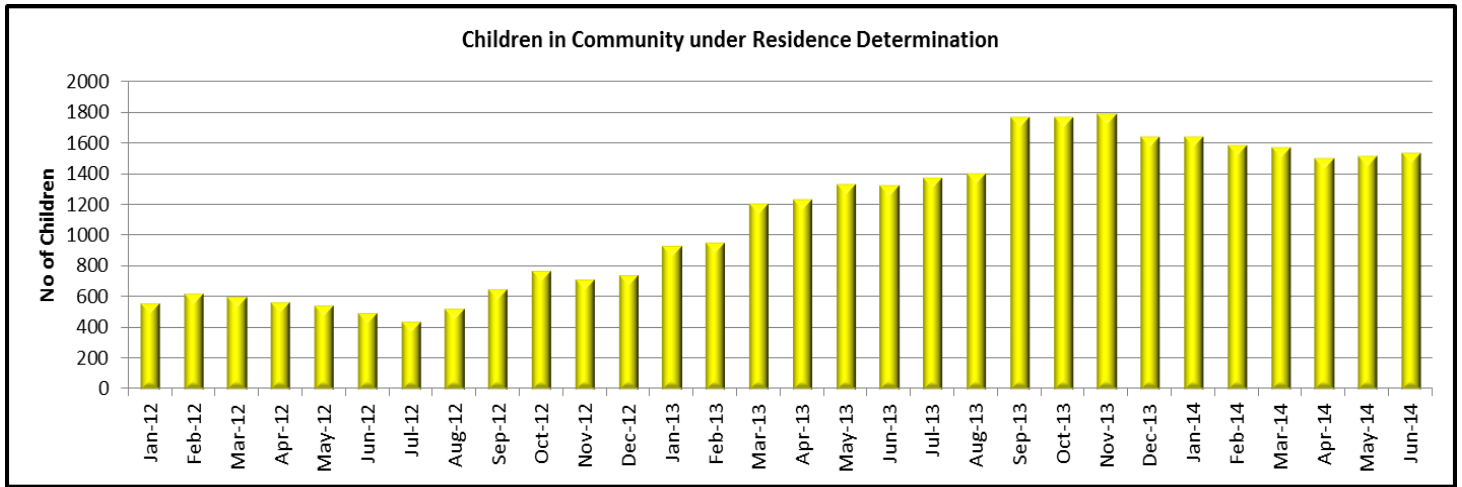

Time in Held Immigration Detention

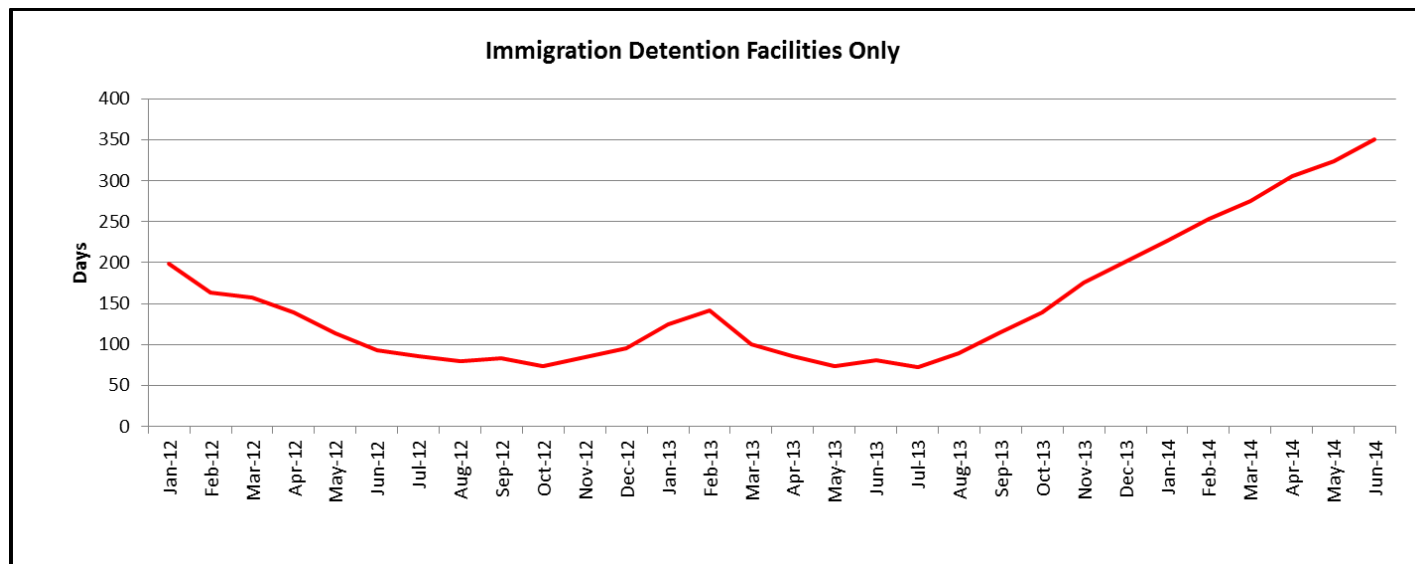
As at 30 June 2014, there were 3624 people in immigration detention facilities. Of these 3624 people, around 9% had been detained for 3 months or less and 71% had been detained for 12 months or less.

The average period of time for people held in detention facilities is steadily increasing to 350 days as at 30 June 2014.

Time in Community Detention

Of the 3007 people in Community Detention, as at 30 June 2014, 11% had been detained under 3 months and 39% had been detained for 12 months or less. This includes the period detained in facilities prior to transferring to Community Detention.
