# Temporary resident (skilled) report 30 June 2018 - summary of key statistics and trends

The Temporary Skill Shortage (TSS) (subclass 482) visa program came into effect on 18 March 2018, at which time the Temporary (Work) Skilled (subclass 457) visa program was abolished. Processing is, however, continuing on the residual subclass 457 visa caseload. The data in this report covers both visas.

### The size of the program

During this reporting period, the size of the overall TSS (and residual subclass 457 visa) program has decreased when compared with the same period last program year as indicated in the table below.

## Pathways to permanent residence

In the 2017-18 program year to 30 June 2018:

- 39,800 temporary resident (skilled) visa holders were granted permanent residence or a provisional visa, a decrease of 21.4 per cent compared with the same period in the previous program year (50,620);
- the vast majority of permanent visa grants to subclass 457 visa holders were in the economic migration stream (96.8 per cent), with the remaining permanent visa grants in the family stream (3.2 per cent).
