A forced marriage is one where a person gets married without freely and fully consenting, because they have been coerced, threatened or deceived, or because they are incapable of understanding the nature and effect of a marriage ceremony (for reasons including age or mental capacity).

Anybody can be a victim of a forced marriage, regardless of their age, gender, sexual orientation or cultural background.

The crime of forced marriage applies to cultural, religious or legal marriages that occur in Australia (including where a person was brought to Australia to get married), as well as where a person is taken from Australia to get married overseas.

If you are, or someone you know is, in or at risk of, a forced marriage, help is available.

In an emergency, call Triple Zero (000) immediately.
