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

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

Introduction

- Australia is grateful for Taiwan's agreement to receive persons from regional processing countries for medical treatment.
 - We look forward to working through the implementation issues during this workshop.
- Australia remains committed to humanitarian resettlement programmes for refugees and
 others in humanitarian need, but as you are aware, the irregular movement of migrants is
 a complex issue that poses significant challenges for all countries.
- Australia's border protection policies aim to discourage people from relying on people smugglers and from attempting to make the dangerous sea voyage to Australia.
 - o If people do try to reach Australia by boat unlawfully, they will be either:
 - safely returned; or
 - transferred to a regional processing country where their protection claims will be assessed.
 - Processing of protection claims and resettlement of persons found to be refugees in a third country, but not Australia, sends a clear message that people smugglers cannot offer a path to Australia.

Medical treatment for refugees/asylum seekers in regional processing countries

- Individuals in regional processing countries, including Nauru, with medical conditions have access to medical treatment in those countries.
- However, in exceptional circumstances, necessary medical treatment is not available.
- The Australian Government is concerned that permitting access to Australia for medical treatment sets a precedent that encourages individuals to take extreme actions, such as engaging in self-harming behaviours, in order to reach Australia.
- Australia is committed to helping regional processing countries to provide appropriate medical care to individuals.
- Taiwan, and specifically s33(a)(iii) , has a reputation for high quality medical care and offers a number of medical specialties that are not readily available in Nauru.
- We are delighted to be close to signing the MOU with Taiwan.
- The workshop is intended to clarify how we will work together to execute a medical transfer.
- We appreciate you making the time, especially during Universide, to participate.
 Note: Universide is an international multi-sport event, organized for university athletes.
 It is being hosted in Taipei between 19-30 August.

Key facts about medical transfers to Taiwan:

The health service provider, International Health and Medical Services (IHMS), delivers
health services to individuals subject to regional processing arrangements in Nauru. As
required, visiting specialists can be engaged to deliver additional medical services.

What is an Overseas Medical Referral (OMR)?

- The Government of Nauru manages the health care of all refugees living in Nauru, with support from Australian-funded contractors. All requests for medical treatment outside Nauru must be considered through the Nauru Department of Health OMR.
- Individuals whose refugee status is yet to be finally determined will be referred for transfer
 to the Department by IHMS via a Request for Medical Movement (RMM) and do not
 require referral under OMR.

What is the time from diagnosis to approval for treatment?

- The timeframe from diagnosis to approval for transfer would vary from case to case.
- The sassassiment can also occur depending on the urgency of medical care.
- The process, once approved, is then managed within the clinical indication of treatment and external factors, such as identity and visa documents being issued.

Handling Note – On 12 February 2018, the existence of a MOU between Australia and Taiwan for medical treatment for transferees in Taiwan broke in a media release from Refugee Action Coalition. At the time of writing, there has been no further substantial media attention.

Key Points

- Australia continues to support Papua New Guinea (PNG) and Nauru to meet the health needs of persons transferred under regional processing arrangements.
 - Australia supports Nauru to establish arrangements for specialist medical services not available in Nauru.
 - Persons in PNG can access specialist medical services in Port Moresby.
- Decisions on medical transfers are made on a case-by-case basis, according to clinical need.
- People transferred to Australia for a temporary purpose, such as medical treatment, are required to return to a regional processing country when they no longer need to be in Australia for the temporary purpose for which they came here, and when it is reasonably practicable to affect their return.
- Medical transfer is not a pathway to remain in Australia.

If asked: Is there an arrangement between Australia and Taiwan for medical transfers?

- Taiwan has agreed to provide specialist medical services to transferees residing in Nauru who require medical treatment not available in Nauru.
 - The arrangement with Taiwan builds on existing bilateral medical arrangements between Nauru and Taiwan.
- Taiwan has a global reputation for high-quality medical care and this arrangement is in-line with Taiwan's existing health cooperation with Nauru, under which Taiwan provides technical assistance to the Republic of Nauru Hospital.

If asked: When did Taiwan and Australia enter the arrangement?

Officials signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in September 2017.

If asked: Will the full text of the MOU be made public – why / why not?

Parties have agreed not to make the contents of the MOU public, and it would be a breach confidence for either party to do so unilaterally.

If asked: How many people have been transferred to Taiwan under this arrangement?

Handling Note – On 12 February 2018, the existence of a medical transfer arrangement between Australia and Taiwan for transferees in Nauru broke in a media release by the Refugee Action Coalition.
