Incident management in the Nauru RPC - transferees

- Service providers in the RPC are responsible for the immediate response and management of all incidents involving transferees, including physical and sexual assaults.
- Incident data is defined by the Department's incident reporting framework. The data reflected within this brief is consistent with the framework. This data therefore may differ from data presented in other forums such as the Nauru Select Committee in 2015, which suggested more incidents.
- Since October 2015 refugees have resided in the RPC pending the construction of settlement accommodation. RPC service providers do not have any authority over refugees on Nauru, including those living at the RPC. As a result the NPF responds to incidents involving refugees at the RPC.

Management of incidents at the RPC and referral to the NPF

- Where the alleged victim consents, allegations of assault are reported to the NPF for investigation.
- In the event of an alleged assault at the RPC, including sexual assault and incidents involving children, the alleged victim is provided with medical treatment and mental health support by IHMS, and referred to the GoN Victim Support Service, as appropriate. The alleged victim's placement within the facility is reviewed for appropriateness.
- If the incident involves a child it is referred to the Broadspectrum Welfare Team and victims are monitored at the weekly Vulnerable Children Meeting. The matter is also referred to the GoN Victim Support Service.
- Where a staff member is alleged to be involved in an assault the allegation is referred to the where a staff member is alleged to be involved in an assault the allegation is referred to the relevant service provider and the NPF for investigation. A staff member may be stood down during investigation of the matter and terminated on substantiation of the allegation or impropriety.

 Ident management in the Nauru Community - refugees

 For incidents involving refugees in the Nauruan community Connect Settlement Services (CSS), the settlement service provider, encourages the alleged victim to report the incident of the settlement service provider.


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The NPF does not provide updates regarding investigations involving refugees to the Department or CSS.

Safety and Security Capacity Building

The Department has funded the deployment of five AFP officers to Nauru to support, mentor and train NPF officers in basic investigations, community policing and dealing with the investigation of child abuse and sexual assault claims reported to the NPF.

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



Abusive/Aggressive Behaviour explanation

At 1 October 2015, the RPC Incident Categorisation Framework was reviewed and the category 'Abusive/Aggressive Behaviour' was removed. Incidents previously captured in that category are now represented between the following three categories:

- 'Antisocial Behaviour';
- 'Assault (non-sexual nature)'; and
- 'Assault (non-sexual nature) on MINOR (up to 18 years of age).

As 'Antisocial Behaviour' is a Category 1 incident, it is no longer a reportable incident. Behaviour of this nature only becomes a reportable incident if it escalates to the point of 'Assault (non-sexual nature)'.



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



- Family members accompanying treating patients are only permitted in exceptional cases.
- The Department maintains that transitory persons will not be permitted to settle in Australia
 and will be returned to Nauru at the conclusion of their medical treatment, or the purpose for
 their temporary transfer.
- The Department has received two cases involving adult family members separated between Nauru and Australia, as a direct result of one or more family members receiving medical treatment.
- In each case the families have been separated for approximately 16-18 months.
- The cases continue to attract interest from external scrutiny organsations. The Department has
 received numerous recommendations from medical professionals stating that the reunion of
 each family group will significantly improve the mental health of all family members.
- The Department continues to consider the temporary reunification of each family group in Australia. To date, information before the Department does not support the reunification of either family group in Australia, noting both are pending return to Nauru.






