- 3. sign the expenditure instrument at Attachment C approving programs of expenditure totalling \$2,671,094 for these two proposals, including administration costs of \$37,000, and
- 4. agree to the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science entering into funding agreement(s) and executing minor variations on your behalf

# **Key Issues**

- 1. On 1 April 2019 you announced two one-off grants for Fortem Australia and the National Police Memorial Co to deliver mental health support for police and emergency services personnel. You identified that the proposed funding source for these grants was from 'confiscated proceeds of crime' under section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002* (the Act).
- 2. In accordance with the Government's Streamlining Government Grants Administration Program, the Department engaged the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science's Business Grants Hub (the Grants Hub) to assess the grant opportunities on its behalf.
- 3. The Grants Hub has assessed both applications against the merit criteria in each of the delegate-approved program guidelines (<u>Attachment A</u> Fortem and <u>Attachment B</u> = National Police Memorial Co) and advised the applications meet each of the selection criteria and represent value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources, consistent with the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013* and the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines.
- 4. The Department recommends you approve both of these grants under section 298 of the Act. If you agree, you must sign the expenditure instrument at <u>Attachment C</u> for costs totalling \$2,671,094. The instrument includes:
  - \$1,884,094 for the Fortem Australia Proceeds of Crime Act program
  - \$19,500 for costs associated with grants administration Fortem Australia
  - \$750,000 for the National Police Memorial Co Phase two of the National Awareness Campaign on Police Officer Mental Wellbeing, and
  - \$17,500 for costs associated with grants administration National Police Memorial Co.
- 5. Should you approve funding, the Grants Hub will negotiate a funding agreement with the successful organisations. During the negotiation of a funding agreement, through to completion of the project, there may be requirements for variations to the approved program. This submission also seeks your agreement to allow officials in the Grants Hub to approve minor variations, such as adjusting deliverables or minor extensions to timeframes, which continue to support the approved program. Variations that significantly alter the approved program will be provided to you for consideration and no variation will result in a cost that exceeds the approved amount.

 Section 298 of the Act authorises you to approve programs of expenditure for measures relating to crime prevention, law enforcement, drug treatment or diversionary measures relating to the illegal use of drugs. s34

#### Fortem Australia

- 7. Fortem Australia is seeking to establish itself as a not-for-profit organisation that will improve the health and wellbeing of Australia's law enforcement and first responder officers. The project will provide evidence-based, comprehensive and integrated mental wellbeing support to individual national security and law enforcement officers and reduce the stigma surrounding mental illness. By achieving this, Fortem Australia will improve the mental health and wellbeing of these officers, thereby improving productivity and performance and keeping Australians safe.
- 8. On 5 November 2018, Fortem Australia wrote to your Office requesting your consideration of an expression of interest for funding under the Act. You responded on 21 November 2018 requesting a formal expression of interest be provided to the Department for consideration.
- 9. On 12 December 2018, the Department received an expression of interest from Soldier On, on behalf of Fortem Australia, requesting funding to deliver a range of initiatives, campaigns and services that would seek to assist law enforcement and first responder officers' mental health and wellbeing. A revised proposal was received on 13 March 2019.
- On 1 April 2019, you announced proposed funding of \$1.88 million over two years for Fortem Australia as part of a mental health support for police and emergency services package. On 12 May 2019, the Department's delegate approved the grant opportunity guidelines, which were released to Fortem Australia on 15 May 2019.
- 11. On 7 June 2019 the Grants Hub provided the Department with an assessment package advising that they are satisfied the proposed spending is value for money and is an efficient, effective, economical and ethical use of resources. A copy of the assessment, including strengths and weaknesses, is at <u>Attachment D</u>.

#### National Police Memorial Co

12. The National Police Memorial Co. is seeking to undertake phase two of the National Awareness Campaign on Police Officer Mental Wellbeing (the campaign). Phase one was funded from the Confiscated Assets Account in 2017-18, with \$1 million being provided to the Police Federation of Australia. The campaign seeks to educate and build resilience in police officers in areas of social, emotional and psychological health associated with policing. The project will educate and build awareness of police officers, particularly to recognise the early signs of emerging mental health and psychological injury issues whilst reducing the stigma associated with these issues. The intended outcomes from phase two of the campaign is to have a healthier and more resilient police force, with officers being able to recognise the early signs of mental health or psychological injury concerns and seek help early.

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- 13. On 4 January 2019, the National Police Memorial Co. wrote to you requesting \$5 million over three years to deliver phase two of the campaign.
- 14. On 14 March 2019 you advised the department that you wished to consider funding the National Police Memorial Co in 2018-19 "with amendment" (MS19-000289 refers). Your office subsequently confirmed that the amendment was for a proposal not exceeding \$750,000.
- 15. On 21 March 2019, the National Police Memorial Co submitted a revised proposal for the delivery of phase two of the campaign, totalling \$750,000 over 12 months.
- 16. On 1 April 2019, you announced proposed funding of \$750,000 over 12 months to the National Police Memorial Co as part of a mental health support for police and emergency services package.
- 17. On 12 May 2019, the Department's delegate approved the grant opportunity guidelines, which were released to the National Police Memorial Co on 15 May 2019.
- 18. On 7 June 2019 the Grants Hub provided the Department with an assessment package advising that they are satisfied the proposed spending is value for money and is an efficient, effective, economical and ethical use of resources. A copy of the assessment, including strengths and weaknesses, is at Attachment E.

# Financial/systems/legislation/deregulation/media implications

24. As at 31 May 2019, \$53.919 million was available for distribution from the Confiscated Assets Account. This is made up of a balance of \$144.774 million, less \$87.826 million suspended in the Account for commitments not yet paid and a notional \$3 million set aside for mondiscretionary payments under section 297 of the Act, such as annual management fees or payments in relation to the conduct of an examination. If you approve these grant opportunities, the balance of the Confiscated Assets Account will be reduced by the equivalent amount. During the 2019 election period, a further \$20 million was announced for round five of the Safer Communities Fund. These funds are not yet reflected in the balance of the Account.

# **Key Issues**

- 1. This submission seeks your approval of a one-off grant to Neighbourhood Watch Australasia for \$800,000 (plus GST), to be funded from the Confiscated Assets Account under section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002*.
- 2. The Department has assessed Neighbourhood Watch Australasia's application against the merit criteria in the approved guidelines. The applications achieved the required minimum of at least 50 per cent against each of the three merit criteria, achieving 70 per cent for criterion one, 72.5 per cent for criterion two and 57.5 per cent for criterion three. The represents value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources, consistent with the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013* and the *Commonwealth Grant Rules and Guidelines* and as a crime prevention measure is consistent with the Proceeds of Crime Act.

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- 4. The Department recommends that you approve grant funding of up to \$800,000 (plus GST) for Neighbourhood Watch by signing the expenditure instrument at Attachment A.
- 5. In accordance with the Government's *Streamlining Grants Administration Program* initiative, the Department has engaged the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science's Business Grants Hub to administer the grant on our behalf. This is a fee-for-service arrangement. The Department recommends that you approve \$35,000 be provided to the Department to cover these costs by signing the expenditure instrument at <u>Attachment A</u>.
- 6. A summary of your key responsibilities under the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act and the *Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines* is at <u>Attachment C</u>.

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- 7. If the grant is approved, the Business Grants Hub will negotiate a funding agreement with Neighbourhood Watch. During the negotiation of a funding agreement, through to completion of the project, there may be requirements for variations to occur. This submission seeks your agreement for Department of Industry, Innovation and Science officials to approve minor variations, such as adjusting deliverables that continue to support the project's outcomes, moving funds between approved items, and adding items that are essential to the delivery of the project, that arise during negotiations and throughout project delivery. Any variation will not result in a cost that exceeds your approved amount.
- On 28 September 2018 (MS18-004048 refers) you noted you wished to consider a proposal 8. from the National Retailer's Association which seeks to leverage Australia's retail network to assist authorities in maximising public safety, particularly through the protection of crowded places, within a Proceeds of Crime Act grants program.
- 9. On 29 November 2018, your office requested that the proposal from the National Retailer's Association be considered sooner. This submission seeks your approval to have the Department of Home Affairs formally request the Department of Finance to cost a proposal from the National Retailer's Association, in accordance with your delegation under the Proceeds of Crime Act.

# Background

- 10. On 28 June 2018 (MS18-000394 refers), you indicated that you wished the Department to explore options for Neighbourhood Watch funding through the Safer Communities Fund. On 6 July 2018, the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet advised that this would not be possible. 0
- 11. A submission (MS18-002616) requesting approval of one-off guidelines and for the Department of Finance to cost the proposal was submitted to the then Assistant Minister for Home Affairs on 27 July 2018. The submission was returned on 29 August 2018, tobe resubmitted for consideration by you when you assumed responsibility for the Proceeds of Crime Act.
- 12. The submission (MS18-002616) was resubmitted on 5 September 2018 and approved by you on 17 September 2018. On 20 September 2018, Neighbourhood Watch was invited to submit an application against the approved guidelines. The application was received on 5 October 2018. The Department assessed the application and sought legal advice.
- 13. On 12 October 2018, the Department requested that the Department of Finance cost the proposal. The Department of Finance provided costing agreement on 16 November 2018.
- On 18 October 2018, the Department requested further clarifying information from Neighbourhood Watch. The final response to this request for information was received by the Department on 22 November 2018.

# Sensitivities

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20. As Neighbourhood Watch has previously received Commonwealth funding for various projects, provision of further funding from the Confiscated Assets Account may lead to expectations that ongoing funding will be provided by the Commonwealth. Due to the unpredictable nature of funding into the Confiscated Assets Account, the Department and the Department of Finance do not consider that ongoing measures should be funded from the Confiscated Assets Account under section 298 of the Proceeds of Crime Act. To mitigate this risk, the production of a satisfactory exit strategy, clearly outlining diversification of funding options for Neighbourhood Watch, will be included as a deliverable within any negotiated Funding Agreement.

# **Key Issues**

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- 1. This submission seeks your approval of a one-off grant to Danny Green's Stop the Coward's Punch Campaign for \$750,000 (plus GST), to be funded from the Confiscated Assets account under section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002*.
- 2. The Department of Industry, Innovation and Science's Business Grants Hub has assessed Cowards Punch Limited's application against the merit criteria in the approved guidelines. The application achieved the required minimum of 50 per cent against each of the three merit criteria, achieving 80 per cent for criterion one, 75 per cent for criterion two and 67 per cent for criterion three. The application represents value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources, consistent with the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013* and the *Commonwealth Grant Rules and Guidelines* and as a crime prevention measure is consistent with the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002*.
- 3. The assessment concludes that the project is likely to increase the reach and exposure of the Coward's Punch Campaign and reduce anti-social behaviour. The organisation has the capacity to deliver the project, including outsourcing activities to experts where required. A need for the funding was demonstrated, including that the campaign would not be delivered within three years without this additional funding. Weaknesses include that project costs are not fully substantiated with some services in the process of being tendered, however, costs for line items will be finalised once funding is approved. Costs that exceed the total approved amount will be met by the organisation. While the organisation can successfully fund raise, the project would be delayed if grant funds were not received. The assessment by the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science is at <u>Attachment B</u>. For further information about the risks see the risk assessment at <u>Attachment C</u>.

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- 5. The Department of Home Affairs (the Department) recommends that you approve grant funding of up to \$750,000 (plus GST) for Cowards Punch Limited to deliver Danny Green's Stop the Coward's Punch Campaign by signing the expenditure instrument at <u>Attachment A</u>.
- 6. In accordance with the Government's Streamlining Grants Administration Program initiative, the Department has engaged the Business Grants Hub to administer the grant on our behalf. This is a fee-for-service arrangement. The Department recommends that you approve \$50,000 to be provided to the Department to cover these costs by signing the expenditure instrument at <u>Attachment A</u>.
- 7. A summary of your key responsibilities under the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability* Act 2013 and the *Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines* is at <u>Attachment D</u>.
- 8. If the grant is approved, the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science will negotiate a funding agreement with Cowards Punch Limited. During the negotiation of a funding agreement, through to completion of the project, there may be requirements for variations to occur. This submission seeks your agreement for the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science officials to approve minor variations, such as adjusting deliverables that continue to support the project's outcomes, moving funds between approved items, and adding items that are essential to the delivery of the project, that arise during negotiations and throughout project delivery. # Background

- 9. On 25 May 2018, you announced that the Government would contribute up to \$750,000 over the next three years to the Stop the Coward's Punch Campaign to develop materials that give young people strategies to avoid violent situations and de-escalation techniques.
- 10. Your office and a departmental officer attended a meeting with Danny Green on 29 June 2018. At the meeting advice was provided to Mr Green on the requirements of an application, the approval process and how the money could be used. The Department understands that your Office and the Office of the Minister for Regional Services worked with Coward's Punch Limited.
- 11. A draft application was provided to your Office by Coward's Punch Limited on 14 September 2018. The Department provided feedback to your office on 19 September 2018 on gaps in the application, including the need for a cost breakdown, specific deliverables and a timeframe for delivery. The Department received no further information to address the gaps.
- 12. The Department engaged the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science to administer the grant at a cost of \$50,000 on 26 September 2018. You approved grant guidelines on 11 October 2018 (MS18-007955 refers).

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13. Despite the best efforts of your office, the Department and the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science, there was a significant delay in receiving the required information from Coward's Punch Limited. The complete application information was provided to the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science by Coward's Punch Limited on 22 November 2018. The Department of Finance provided agreed costing on 14 December 2018.

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## Daniel Morcombe Foundation - recommended for funding

- 5. The Daniel Morcombe Foundation has sought a grant of \$1.8 million (GST exclusive) over three years for the *Keeping Australia's Kids Safe Prevention and early intervention of harmful sexual behaviours in pre-teens* program.
- 6. Consistent with your approval in MS19-002984 (14 October 2019), the Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resources' Business Grants Hub has assessed the Daniel Morcombe Foundation's application against the one-off program guidelines (approved by a Departmental Delegate). The Business Grants Hub is satisfied that the spending proposal represents value for money and is an efficient, effective, economical and ethical use of resources that is consistent with the policies of the Commonwealth. In finalising recommendations for funding, the Business Grants Hub assessed the strengths and weaknesses of the eligible application against the following merit criteria:
  - Criterion 1: Alignment with section 298 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002
  - Criterion 2: Capacity, capability and resources to deliver the project, and
  - Criterion 3: Impact of grant funding on your project.
- 7. The program guidelines are at <u>Attachment D</u>, and the Business Grants Hub assessment, including strengths and weaknesses and a risk assessment, is at <u>Attachment E</u>.
- If you approve this grant the Department recommends you should sign the expenditure instrument at <u>Attachment B</u>. In accordance with the Government's *Streamlining Grants*. Administration Program initiative, the Department has engaged the Business Grants Hub to administer the grant on our behalf. The expenditure instrument includes \$20,000 to cover these costs.

#### **Crime Stoppers National Firearms Campaign**

12. At the meeting of the Ministerial Council for Police and Emergency Management on 20 November 2019, Ministers agreed to a permanent firearms amnesty. The Department sought a proposal from Crime Stoppers Australia for a National Illicit Firearms Campaign (consistent with MS19-002984).

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- 13. Crime Stoppers provided a proposal to Assistant Minister Wood (<u>Attachment G</u>) for possible funding under section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002*. This is for a two-phase campaign costing \$4.5 million over six months, to be delivered in two, three-month phases.
  Phase 1 would support the national firearms amnesty from 1 July 2020, with Australians being encouraged to hand in illicit firearms. Phase 2 would encourage Australians to report information about illicit firearms to Crime Stoppers, with rewards offered. This would coincide with a proposed national week of action to seize illicit firearms, supported by law enforcement agencies nationally.

- 15. The Department currently funds Crime Stoppers under the Grants to Australian Organisations Program for \$3.76 million over 5 years until 30 June 2020. The Department considers there is insufficient funding available under the Grants to Australian Organisations Program to support existing ongoing crime prevention activities as well as the proposed one-off National Illicit Firearms Campaign (MS20-000020 - Future funding of Crime Stoppers Australia and Neighbourhood Watch Australasia refers).
- 16. Consistent with previous approvals (MS18-009629 and MS19-002984) if you agree to consider the campaign in 2020-21 the next steps are for the Department, with the Business Grants Hub, to develop one-off program guidelines for approval by a Senior Executive Service officer in the Department. Crime Stoppers would be invited to apply against the program guidelines and the Business Grants Hub will assess the proposal. The Department will then reduest a Costing Agreement from the Department of Finance and provide you with a funding recommendation in early 2020-21 financial year.

# Background

- 17. Section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002* authorises you to approve the use of funds from the Confiscated Assets Account for the purposes of crime prevention, law enforcement, drug addiction and diversionary measures relating to illegal drug use.

Section 71 of the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013 states that you must not approve a proposed expenditure of relevant money unless you are satisfied, after making reasonable inquiries, that the expenditure would be a proper use of relevant money and you must record the terms of any approval as soon as practicable after giving the approval. The Department considers these proposals to offer value for money.

# **Key Issues**

- Your Office has requested advice about the status of implementing the Early Intervention Stream of round five of the Safer Communities Fund (up to \$15 million available), and options to deliver the program as soon as possible.
- 2. Currently the program guidelines are for a restricted, targeted funding round to existing funded organisations delivering crime prevention activities to disadvantaged, at-risk youth. Following MS19-002590, the Assistant Minister for Customs, Community Safety and Multicultural Affairs requested that the scope of this program be revised to allow for an open competitive round available to any organisation delivering programs to assist at-risk youth in disadvantaged locations nationally.

#### **Current guidelines**

- 3. The current program guidelines (<u>Attachment A</u>) outline merit assessment criteria, funding available and eligibility requirements for the restricted funding round. These program guidelines direct the remaining \$15 million for round five of the Safer Communities Fund to a targeted stream where peak state or territory Police Citizens Youth Clubs, Bluelight organisations and Youth Off The Streets can apply to deliver youth engagement activities aimed at crime prevention. Existing funding provided under round three of the Safer Communities Fund ends in March 2020.
- If you wish to proceed with the current guidelines, you should sign the Expenditure Instrument (<u>Attachment B</u>) authorising the Australian Financial Security Authority to release funds for allocation to grants and administration for round five of the Safer Communities Fund. s34

- 5. This submission will then be referred to Assistant Minister Wood for consideration to approve the current program guidelines (<u>Attachment A</u>), consider the risk assessment (<u>Attachment C</u>) and write to the Minister for Finance seeking authority to release the program guidelines (<u>Attachment D</u>). As the Grants Hub has already developed the necessary systems to open the program in its current form, applications could be received as soon as the Minister for Finance approves the program guidelines. ## **Expanded scope**

8. The Department has worked with the Grants Hub and central agencies in considering a number of options to expand the scope of the Early Intervention Stream to allow a broader range of organisations and activities to be eligible in line with Assistant Minister Wood's request whilst avoiding cost-prohibitive administration expenses. The revised proposal (Attachment E) has been designed to broaden the scope of the program but appropriately limit the type, and number of organisations eligible to apply so that there is only a modest increase in administration costs. Given the significant change in scope, approvals required, and necessary systems development by the Grants Hub it is unlikely that a redesigned program could open before April 2020.

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# Background

10. The organisations included in the current restricted funding round have a proven track record in delivering youth engagement activities and have been funded under round three of the Safer Communities Fund (early intervention stream) in 2018-19, and previously under the Safer Streets Program (since 2014) under similar early intervention targeted program guidelines. These organisations have a unique ability to target, reach and engage at risk youth to divert them from the criminal justice system. The connection of these entities with local law enforcement makes them distinct from other organisations undertaking intervention activities with at risk young people and is in-line with the Safer Communities Fund crime prevention focus. Existing funding provided under round three of the Safer Communities Fund ends in March 2020.

### **Key Issues**

- 1. Your approval is sought to award up to \$15 million (GST exclusive) for the delivery of six recommended early intervention projects in the order of merit at <u>Attachment A</u>.
- 2. The order is based on the Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resource's Business Grants Hub's (the Business Grants Hub) recommendation and the funding available. The six recommended projects are located in New South Wales (2), Victoria (1), Queensland (2) and Western Australia (1).
- The round was oversubscribed with a total of 12 applications seeking \$25,778,437. In accordance with the program guidelines, the Business Grants Hub assessed six projects as eligible and recommended (<u>Attachment A</u>), two as eligible and suitable subject to funding availability (<u>Attachment B</u>) and four as ineligible (<u>Attachment C</u>).

### Eligible applications

- 4. All of the eight eligible organisations represent value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources consistent with the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013 (the Act). However, the available funding of \$15 million only supports five of the six recommended projects being funded in full.
- 5. There will be insufficient funds remaining (\$1,985,924) to fully fund the sixth ranked project (\$3 million for the Queensland Police Citizens Youth Welfare Association). If you agree, the Business Grants Hub will offer the Queensland Police Citizens Youth Welfare Association the opportunity to revise its project to within the available funds. If that is declined, your approval is sought to fund projects assessed as suitable as per the order in <u>Attachment B</u> until funds are exhausted. This is the same process followed in the instance that any successful applicant declines an offer of funding or if additional funding becomes available.
- 6. Projects on the suitable list, but with insufficient funds available, are located in the Australian Capital Territory and South Australia (ranked in that order). No eligible applications were received from organisations in Tasmania or the Northern Territory.

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### Background

11. Round 5 of the Safer Communities Fund makes up to \$55.1 million (including \$5.1 million in administration costs) in grant funding available to implement the Government's 2019 election commitment to help local communities tackle crime hotspots, strengthen security for schools and boost crime prevention efforts. Grant funding of \$50 million is split across three streams as follows: \$31 million for eligible councils, schools, pre-schools and other community organisations that are facing security risks associated with racial and/or religious intolerance for security infrastructure (infrastructure stream); \$4 million for the Northern Territory for improved security systems, lighting, CCTV cameras and other infrastructure/activities to address anti-social behaviour (Northern Territory stream); and \$15 million for the early intervention stream.



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- 12. The early intervention stream of round 5 of the Safer Communities Fund makes up to \$15 million (GST exclusive) million available to peak Police Citizen and Youth Clubs, Bluelights and the Youth off the Streets organisation to deliver crime prevention or activity based youth engagement projects. In line with the request from your Office on 30 April 2020, the early intervention funding recommendations are being provided for your consideration as a priority. You will receive a separate submission (MS20-000851) making recommendations with respect to the round 5 infrastructure streams.
- On 12 January 2020, you approved the Safer Communities Fund: Round 5 Early Intervention grants program guidelines (MS19-004017), (<u>Attachment E</u>). Applications opened on 20 February 2020 and closed on 19 March 2020. On 16 April 2020, the Business Grants Hub provided assessments on applications to all three streams.
- 14. The majority of organisations eligible to apply for funding under the stream have funding arrangements supporting early intervention activities under round 3 of the Safer Communities Fund. Approving further funding in a timely manner will ensure funded organisations can retain existing staffing for these activities.

- 19. Potential criticism could arise in relation to the restricted competitive process used to allocate funding under the early intervention stream, as well as the uneven jurisdictional distribution of the funded projects. UnitingCare Wesley Bowden in South Australia complained about the limits on competition in the approach and requested an open competitive tender process.
- 20. The Program Guidelines did not seek to distribute funding according to geographic location, rather to provide funding to the most meritorious applications, according to the merit criteria. The process is appropriate for issuing grants process (as opposed to procuring services where a tender arrangement is generally more suitable). Targeting of the round aims to leverage existing strong and established relationships with local law enforcement agencies to reach and engage at risk youth to divert them from the criminal justice system. The connection of these entities with local law enforcement makes them distinct from other organisations.

- 21. Funding projects that are not eligible or that are funded against the merit order as assessed by the Business Grants Hub would go against processes established in the published program guidelines. It will create a risk that higher ranked applicants would be disadvantaged and is highly likely to attract media scrutiny and criticism from the Australian National Audit Office.

- 1. This submission seeks your approval of three sets of guidelines which outline merit assessment criteria, funding available, and eligibility requirements for applicants under round five of the Safer Communities Fund as follows:
  - Safer Communities Fund Round 5: Infrastructure grants (Attachment A)
  - Safer Communities Fund Round 5: Northern Territory Infrastructure grants (Attachment B)
  - Safer Communities Fund Round 5: Early Intervention grants (Attachment C).

- 3. Approving these guidelines by 25 September 2019 will allow the Department of Home Affairs to complete arrangements with the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science (which administers the program on our behalf) to open the round on or around 15 October 2019. The funding round would then close on 10 December 2019.

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Expanding the Early Intervention guidelines to allow sporting clubs to apply

s22(1)(a)(ii)

- 7. The risks, including legislative and policy issues associated with broadening the scope of the early intervention funding approach to sporting organisations, are unlikely to be resolved until early 2020. This is due to the funding being available to a broader target audience for social inclusion, rather than direct crime prevention purposes. In addition, the number of applications that could be expected should this funding stream be opened to allow sporting clubs nationally to apply for small grants, would substantially increase the costs and time to assess grant applications, and administer the funding arrangements. This may impact on the amount of funds available to potential grant recipients.
- 8. Due to the policy authority of the program, and the requirement that proceeds of crime funds be used to support crime prevention and law enforcement activities, sports clubs would need to be in a position to demonstrate that their activities are having a direct impact on young people who are in contact with, or at risk of involvement with the criminal justice system. Given the small and voluntary nature of most local sporting associations, these groups may not be in the best position to provide the necessary evidence base to demonstrate either the risk of their young members falling within the offender category or the ability to track the impact of their sporting activities on these members rates offending or recidivism rates over the longer term.
- Should you wish to proceed with this approach, the Department will provide further advice about the risks, costs, and timing implications.
- Should you agree to accept all guidelines in their current form, please sign the letter at (<u>Attachment E</u>) seeking the Minister for Finance's approval to release the guidelines in accordance with the mandatory requirements of the Estimates Memorandum 2018/39 'Process for seeking Finance Minister Agreement before the release of new or revised program guidelines'.
- If you wish the department to revisit the design of the early intervention funding stream, please sign the alternative letter at (<u>Attachment F</u>) to allow the Infrastructure and Northern Territory funding streams to proceed with anticipated opening in mid-October 2019.

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### Background

- 12. The draft guidelines have been developed in accordance with the *Commonwealth Grant Rules and Guidelines*. The Department worked with the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science to develop the guidelines, and they have been agreed with the Department of Finance and the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet. The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet advised it preferred the early intervention grant guidelines to be open and competitive, rather than restricted to specific providers, but accepted the rationale provided by this Department that the eligible providers connection with local law enforcement makes them distinct from other organisations undertaking intervention activities with at risk young people which is consistent with the Safer Communities Fund crime prevention focus.
- 13. The Safer Communities Fund implements a 2016 election commitment to deliver safer communities by boosting the efforts of local councils and community organisations to address crime and antisocial behaviour by funding crime prevention initiatives. Five rounds of the Program totalling \$180.1 million have been announced.
- 14. Round five provides \$55.1 million (including administration costs) for organisations to address crime and anti-social behaviour through funding crime prevention initiatives that aim to protect schools, pre-schools and community organisations that are facing security risks associated with racial or religious intolerance. The round will:
  - Implement the Government's 2019 election commitment, as announced on 30 April 2019 to invest a further \$20 million from proceeds of crime through the Safer Communities, Fund, increasing total available funds from \$35.1 million to \$55.1 million.
  - implement the Government's 2019 election commitment, as announced on 24 April 2019, to provide \$4 million to the Northern Territory for improved security systems, lighting, CCTV and other infrastructure/activities that address antisocial behaviour.
  - provide additional funding (approximately \$31 million) to eligible councils, schools, pre-schools and other community organisations that are facing security risks associated with racial and/or religious intolerance, following the over-subscription to round four of the Fund.
  - provide approximately \$15 million to approximately 12 Police Citizens and Youth Clubs, Bluelights and Youth off the Streets to deliver crime prevention or activity based youth engagement projects.

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15. The Department's recommendation to approve the round five early intervention guidelines as drafted is also informed by the Commonwealth Grant Rules and Guidelines which provide that existing grant opportunities may only be expanded to meet an identified need and must avoid duplication of grant opportunity guidelines. The Department of Health's Office of Sport has advised the Department that they anticipate opening a \$71 million social cohesion package in late 2019 or early 2020 that will direct funding to sport and recreation projects to address diversity and inclusion issues for vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals and their families. Community sports clubs will be eligible to apply for these funds, and lowering participation barriers to ensure youth participation in local sporting clubs will be a specific focus.

### Financial/systems/legislation/deregulation/media implications

24. Spending under round five is authorised under section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002* (the Act). Section 298 of the Act provides legislative authority for the Commonwealth to spend confiscated assets for crime prevention measures, law enforcement measures and measures relating to the treatment and use of illegal drugs. <sup>\$42</sup>

- 25. Round five will provide \$55.1 million in *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002* funding and has a broader scope, covering all aspects of previous rounds, including for organisations to address crime and anti-social behaviour by funding crime prevention initiatives, as well as funding to protect schools, pre-schools and community organisations that are facing security risks associated with racial or religious intolerance. Currently, approximate funding is \$31 million to Infrastructure grants, \$15 million for Early Intervention grants, \$4 million for the Northern Territory election commitment, and \$5.1 million departmental funding for administration.
- 26. The final split between each of the funding streams will be determined once applications have been received, so amounts in each set of guidelines are approximate. We will seek your approval of the final split between each stream once applications have been assessed. For example, should the early intervention stream or Northern Territory streams be undersubscribed, funds could be redirected to the Infrastructure stream.
- 27. Once program guidelines are approved, a draft media release will be provided to your Office to announce the opening of round five of the Safer Communities Fund.

### **Key Issues**

- Round 5 of the Safer Communities Fund Program (the Program) makes up to \$55.1 million (including \$5.1 million in administration costs) in grant funding available to implement the Government's 2019 election commitment to help local communities tackle crime hotspots, strengthen security for schools and boost crime prevention efforts.
- 2. Grant funding of \$50.0 million is split across three streams as follows:
  - \$31.0 million for eligible councils, schools, pre-schools and other community organisations that are facing security risks associated with racial and/or religious intolerance for security infrastructure (infrastructure stream);
  - \$4.0 million for the Northern Territory for improved security systems, lighting, cameras and other infrastructure/activities to address anti-social behaviour (Northern Territory stream); and
  - \$15.0 million for peak Police Citizens and Youth Clubs, Bluelights and Youth of the Streets to deliver early intervention projects (early intervention stream).
- 3. You have been provided a separate brief with funding recommendations for the early intervention stream (refer MS20-000852) as there is more urgency to commit funding for this stream.
- 4. Your approval is sought to award up to:
  - \$30,995,798 (GST exclusive) for the delivery of 80 recommended infrastructure projects at <u>Attachment A</u>; and
  - \$3,861,524 (GST exclusive) for the delivery of 12 recommended Northern Territory infrastructure projects at <u>Attachment E</u>.

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- 5. The Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resource's Business Grants Hub (the Business Grants Hub) has assessed the merits of the 635 eligible applications received to the infrastructure stream and the 29 eligible applications received to the Northern Territory stream against the approved program guidelines (<u>Attachment J</u>). Both funding streams were oversubscribed and there is insufficient funding available from within each stream to allocate to all suitable projects.
- 6. The recommended projects have been ranked in order of merit. The Business Grants Hub's assessment for recommended projects for each stream is summarised in <u>Attachment A</u> (infrastructure) and <u>Attachment E</u> (Northern Territory). The Department supports the Business Grant's Hub assessment that the listed projects represent the best value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources consistent with the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013.

### Lists of additional suitable projects

- 7. Your approval is also sought to fund projects assessed as suitable for funding from both streams (<u>Attachments B and F</u>) should funding become available through the funding agreement negotiation process. During the negotiation process, ineligible expenditure may be removed or applicants may withdraw. These reserve projects would be funded in the order that they were ranked until all funding is exhausted. All listed applications were assessed as suitable and represent value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources consistent with the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013.
- 8. Where there are two or more projects that have received the same score by the Business Grant's Hub merit assessment, we recommend that you rank the order in which those projects should be considered for funding. A column has been included in each list of suitable projects where ranking is required by you. It is anticipated that no more than approximately \$3.9 million in additional funding will become available in the infrastructure funding stream, so we do not advise you to rank projects after that point, as indicated at <u>Attachment B</u>. A summary of the merit assessment of each project is included in the additional suitable projects lists to assist the ranking process where projects have been given the same score.

### Applications not recommended for funding

- <u>Attachments C and D</u> (infrastructure) and <u>Attachments G and H</u> (Northern Territory)]]ist applications within each stream that the Department does not recommended funding, either because they scored below 50 per cent against one or more of the merit criteria, and are therefore not suitable, they were deemed ineligible or were withdrawn by the applicants.
- 10. Should you choose to fund any of these applications you should consider the reasons why these applications have not been recommended as summarised in each attachment. You must be satisfied that the expenditure would be a proper use of public money, consistent with the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act. ### Background

11. The Safer Communities Fund Program implements a 2016 election commitment to deliver safer communities by boosting the efforts of local councils and community organisations to address crime and antisocial behaviour by funding crime prevention initiatives. Five rounds of the Program totalling \$180.1 million (including administration costs) have been announced.

### Infrastructure stream

- 12. The infrastructure stream implements the Government's 2019 election commitment, as announced on 30 April 2019 to provide additional funding (approximately \$31.0 million) for security infrastructure to eligible councils, schools, pre-schools and other community organisations that are facing security risks associated with racial and/or religious intolerance, following the over-subscription to round four.
- 13. You approved the infrastructure stream guidelines on 29 September 2019 (MS19-00250). The round opened on 29 October 2019 and closed on 10 December 2019.
- Funding of \$31 million is available to eligible organisations to fund security infrastructure such as CCTV cameras, bollards, fencing, gates, and alarm systems and for schools to fund licenced security guards.
- 15. 688 applications were received under this stream and 634 applications were eligible, 19 applications were ineligible, 35 applications were withdrawn after the closing date of the Program and 179 applications are suitable for funding (achieving the minimum required standard) to a value of \$56,285,804 (GST exclusive).
- 16. The infrastructure stream guidelines require grants to be awarded on the basis of the application of merit assessment and the availability of funds. 179 applications were assessed as suitable, scoring between 98 and 50 of the total 100 points, and as representing value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources consistent with the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013.
- 17. Eligible applications are recommended to be funded in the order that they were merit ranked until all funding is exhausted. This would fund the top 80 applications to a value of \$30,995,798 (GST exclusive). In the event that funding becomes available through the funding agreement negotiation process a reserve list of the 99 suitable applications (ranked 81+179) will be used to continue to allocate funding until all funding is exhausted. There were 19 ineligible applications and 456 applications assessed as not suitable.

### Northern Territory Infrastructure stream

- 18. The Northern Territory infrastructure stream implements the Government's 2019 election organisations and local government agencies in the Northern Territory. Grants of up to \$1.0 million (GST exclusive) are available for infrastructure and environmental design activities to reduce crime, violence, anti-social behaviour and/or other security risks and improve community safety and wellbeing in the Northern Territory.
- 19. You approved the Northern Territory infrastructure stream guidelines on 29 September 2019 The round opened on 29 October 2019 and closed on 10 December 2019.

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- 20. Funding of \$4.0 million is available for the Northern Territory infrastructure stream to deliver improved security systems, lighting, CCTV and other infrastructure/activities that address antisocial behaviour in the Northern Territory.
- 21. 31 applications were received under this stream and 29 applications were eligible, two applications were ineligible and 26 applications were considered suitable for funding to a recommended value of \$5,596,834 (GST exclusive).
- 22. The Northern Territory infrastructure stream guidelines require grants to be awarded on the basis of the merit assessment and the availability of funds. 26 applications were assessed as suitable, scoring between 94 and 53 of the total 100 points, and as representing value for money and a proper use of Commonwealth resources consistent with the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines and the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013.
- 23. The Department recommends that applications assessed as suitable for funding be funded in the order that they were ranked until all funding is exhausted. This would fund the top 12 suitable applications to a value of \$3,861,524 (GST exclusive). In the event that funding becomes available through the funding agreement negotiation process the list of additional suitable projects will be used in order of ranking to allocate funding until all funding is exhausted.

### Early Intervention stream

- 24. The early intervention stream makes up to \$15.0 million available to peak Police Citizen and Youth Clubs, Bluelights and Youth off the Streets to deliver crime prevention or activity based youth engagement projects. The approved guidelines established a targeted restricted funding round open to these organisations making grants of up to \$3 million (GST exclusive) available for youth engagement activities aimed at crime prevention.
- 25. You approved the early intervention stream guidelines on 12 January 2020 (MS19-004071) and the round opened on 20 February 2020 and closed on 19 March 2020. MS20-000852 seeks your approval to award \$15.0 million (GST exclusive) for the delivery of six recommended early intervention projects in New South Wales (2), Queensland (2), Victoria (1) and Western Australia (1).

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- 44. - 45. Round 5 applicants include high profile community and religious organisations that have received media attention in the past. There has been increased media interest in grant decisions in recent months. It is recommended that a media release announcing grant recipients is prepared. It is recommended the talking points include an explanation of the grants process, including assessment criteria.
