



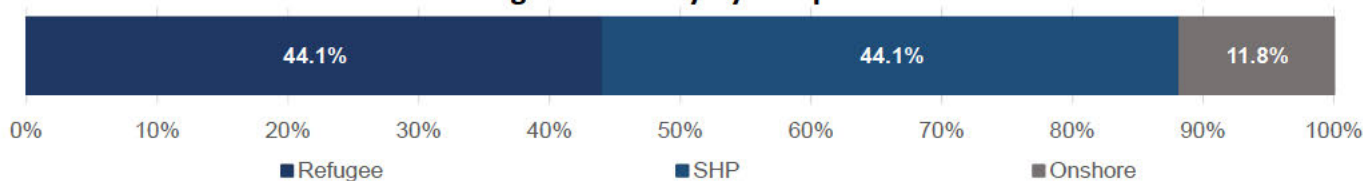

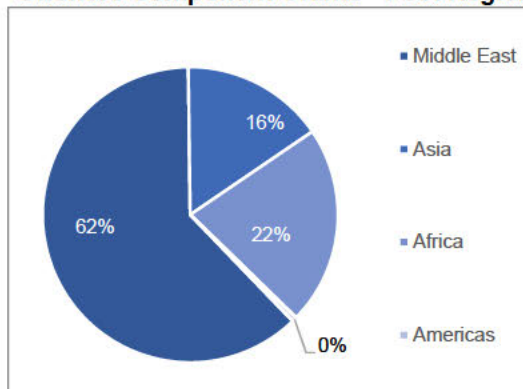

I am writing to provide you with an overview of the Australian Government's resettlement priorities for its 2019-20 Humanitarian Program s. 22(1)(a)(ii)

The Australian Government has committed to maintain the size of its Humanitarian Program at 18,750 places in 2019-20 and over the next two years. s. 22(1)(a)(ii)

For the Middle East region, the Australian Government remains focused on resettling vulnerable minorities with the least prospect of safe return, with some flexibility available to consider compelling cases outside of this ambit. s. 22(1)(a)(ii)

In 2019-20, Australia has an increased focus on vulnerable women and children, with 20 per cent of offshore resettlement places (3,220) allocated to this group, up from 15 per cent (2,650) in 2018-19. One hundred places are also available for women and girls from the Middle East fleeing oppressive patriarchal regimes and male guardianship laws. We welcome UNHCR's referral of suitable cases.

Australia also requests referrals to fill at least ten visa places for a new Unaccompanied Humanitarian Minor (UHM) Pilot, commencing in 2019-20. s. 22(1)(a)(ii)

The 13-14 year old age group is considered appropriate for the Pilot as better settlement outcomes are likely to be achieved if children remain in the UHM Program for four years or more. s. 22(1)(a)(ii)

In 2019-20, at least one hundred visa places across all regions are also available for a new lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and/or intersex (LGBTI) Pilot to provide resettlement of refugees persecuted or at heightened need of protection because of their sexual orientation or gender identity. We welcome referrals of suitable cases.

The vulnerable women and children component, and the UHM and LGBTI Pilots are not restricted to the key nationality groups detailed in this letter. Referrals of refugees from countries outside of these groups will be considered subject to other parameters applying to Australia's Program.

Hi all

I have been going through emails sent during the past six weeks and I realised that there may have been some confusion about Mr Coleman's final decision on the composition of the 2019-20 Humanitarian Program.

The attached spreadsheet, in conjunction with the proportional allocations by specific cohort (eg Yazidis, Chins etc) and his desire to ensure at least 40% of entrants are settled in regional Australia, sets out his decision.

It was the basis for the Humanitarian Program announcement during the election campaign.
