I recently met with you in relation to action in response to climate change and appreciated your willingness to listen to our concerns. Today, I am writing to plea for a different cause.

s. 47F(1), and their two young daughters, are a young Tamil family currently in immigration detention and facing deportation on 1st February, 2019.

As a young couple s. 47F(1) fled from persecution in Sri Lanka and were granted asylum in Australia in 2012-13. Over a period of four years they have integrated into the regional community of Biloela in central Queensland where s. 47F(1) gave birth to their two daughters. These children are currently stateless, as Australia does not recognise them (in conflict with the Convention on the Rights of the Child) and they are not recognised in Sri Lanka.

It seems it is still not safe for this family to return to Sri Lanka. The UN Special Rapporteur on Human Rights noted only last year that 'a culture of torture' exists in Sri Lanka towards Tamils.

Furthermore the family have integrated well into the regional community they adopted as their new home. They have abided by Australian values and laws and have contributed much needed skills. Since they were placed in detention ten months ago over 153,000 people have signed a petition to have them returned to Biloela.







The people of Biloela have consistently demonstrated their determination to bring s. 47F(1) and the girls home to Biloela. Over 180,000 Australians have signed an online petition in support of this goal.

If allowed to return, s. 47F(1) story could inspire other migrants and refugees to experience the benefits of rural living for themselves. Removing this family from Australia will send the opposite message.

s. 47F(1) were assessed under the Government's dubious 'fast track' assessment and found to not be refugees. However, anyone familiar with the current situation in Sri Lanka knows that the Tamil community are subject to ongoing harassment, persecution, arrest, imprisonment, 'disappearance' and murder, and that s. 47F(1) should have been recognised as refugees.

I believe it is a matter of urgent public interest that this family be granted the right to remain permanently in Australia.

Will you please urgently raise this matter with Senator Reynolds and ask that she immediately use her public interest powers under the Migration Act to allow \$.47F(1) to remain in Australia?
