It would be negligent for me to not highlight the risks of the rapid responses which were required in this instance of responding to these QoNs.

The rapid timeframe to respond to the approximately 50 questions contained within these 12 QoNs was inadequate for the CRU in its current capacity and capability to build the required bespoke reporting to confidently address them. The reality was there was approximately a week's work effort to do this, which did not include an opportunity for adequate cross-checking or due diligence. (Data clearance is primarily superficial as it does not necessarily include either cross-checking or due diligence).

Consequently there is an increased risk error in the rapid responses ABF provided, let alone a risk we cannot provide consistency in the future as some of the data definitions applied may not have been adequately captured, nor air endorsed by the appropriate business owner. 3 Aff

In addition there probably needs to be a greater understanding that data stabilisation has often not occurred do reporting to recent dates as data cleansing has often not occurred. 

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
