I am writing to register complaints against the Bill. Broadly speaking my concerns are:

- The possibility for encryption back-doors to be exploited by malicious parties, foreign spies and hackers. I believe this has not been given enough weight, and government interference in privately developed technology with poorly implemented legislation will only decrease online security.
- That this bill will do nothing to stop capable criminals and terrorists who will always have access to open-source encryption.
- There are not sufficient evidence that any investigation has actually been significantly hampered by standard encrypted messaging apps. Examples given thusfar (on the bill's website for instance) include Snapchat and FB Messenger. Both platforms have a long history of aiding police investigation already, why do authorities need further back-door capabilities?
- The potential for journalists and whistle-blowers who want to keep sources and communication private, to be compromised or targeted.

I believe that this bill should be abandoned pending further impartial review of the needs of authorities with concrete evidence towards how modern investigations actually work.
