My name is Luke Fries, I am the founder and CEO of R3DCITY - a technology startup based in Sydney.

I am writing to you today to express my concern about the proposed federal "Assistance and Access Bill 2018" and what it would mean for myself, my company and Australia in general.

This bill, allowing the government to force Australian companies to comply with surveillance via compromising the digital security our our products and services - is a terrible idea. The act of watering down encryption or adding side channel access to digital products means that those services are now exposed to manipulation by non-authorised parties including computer hackers, criminals or even foreign governments, and those services are also exposed to bad actors within the Australian government itself.

It has already been proven that the Australian metadata retention scheme has been abused by privileged employees with access to the system. The Australian government also failed to run a successful digital census. The Australian government has allowed our health information to be compromised. The Australian government allowed a defence contractor to be hacked, losing the plans to no less than the new ASIO building. Recently, the Bureau of Meteorology was also hacked by a foreign government.


The Australian government cannot even protect itself digitally, yet it asks for access to all systems run by Australians.
