Both myself, as well as everyone I know, is strongly opposed to this bill. It will have drastic negative consequences on the freedom and privacy of Australian citizens, with extremely little benefit.

While I understand the bill is well-meaning, it opens up massive opportunities for bad actors, hackers, and other not-so-well-meaning parties. It brings us several steps closer to a potential Orwellian future.

Additionally, the bill as I understand it would have drastic consequences on the Australian tech industry. Both companies and individuals involved in said industry will be driven away to other nations. I fear many companies will refuse to allow Australians to use their online businesses, possibly similar but much worse to what has occurred with GDRP.

This bill *will not* make it harder for terrorist groups and organised criminals to avoid detection and disruption. It's not possible to enforce the bill on every company, big and small.
