About this report

This report provides an overview of the number of people in immigration detention in Australia as at midnight on the date of the report. The report is produced on a monthly basis.

Data is sourced from several departmental processing and recording systems. Data relating to the immigration detention population is dynamic and there can be delays in transmission of information from the department's immigration detention network operations. Variations in figures between this report and previous issues can occur. Due to these issues, data from the current financial year should always be considered provisional.

Immigration Detention Statistics Summary

As at: 31 July 2013

There were 10201 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention, including 6968 in immigration detention on the mainland and 3233 in immigration detention on Christmas Island as at 31 July 2013.

Separately, 2773 people have been approved for a residence determination to live in the community.





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Immigration Detention Population from 1990 to 31 July 2013

The number of people in immigration detention month to month continues to fluctuate, predominantly due to the changing pattern of unauthorised maritime arrivals. The number of unauthorised maritime arrivals in December 2012 and January 2013 were down compared to the preceding 11 months. Arrivals since February 2013 have increased and contributed to the high number of people in immigration detention.





People in Immigration Detention by Arrival Type

The number of people in immigration detention, who arrived unlawfully by air or boat as at 31 July 2013 was 12,511. This represents about 96% of the total immigration detention population.

There were also 463 people (about 4% of the total immigration population) who arrived in Australia lawfully and were subsequently taken into immigration detention for either overstaying or breaching their visa conditions, resulting in visa cancellations.




Figure 2 - People in Immigration Detention by Arrival Type

People in Immigration Detention by Nationality

Of the 10201 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention as at 31 July 2013 around 34% were Iranian nationals, 14% were Sri Lankan nationals and 10% were Afghan nationals.

Of the 2773 people approved to live in the community under residence determination, as at 31 July 2013 around 31% were Iranian nationals, 23% were Sri Lankan nationals and 14% were Afghan nationals.

Children in Immigration Detention

As at 31 July 2013 there were 1992 children (aged under 18 years) in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention.

The increase in the number of children in immigration detention facilities in November and December 2012 was due to a rapid increase in unauthorised maritime arrivals from October to November 2012. The number of children in immigration detention facilities reduced in January and February 2013 as children completed mandatory processing and were transferred into the community. Because of the high number of recent arrivals over the past four months, children in immigration detention facilities and alternate places of detention has again increased.





Figure 3 - Children in Immigration Detention Facilities and Alternative Places of Detention

The number of children approved to live in the community under a residence determination has been maintained at a high level. This reflects the Government's policy of placing children in the community as soon as possible after the completion of mandatory checks.





As at 31 July 2013, 1992 children remain in immigration detention while undergoing initial processing. 1363 children were approved under residence determination for community placement.

Time in Held Immigration Detention


Of the 10201 people in held immigration detention as at 31 July 2013, around 80% had been detained for three months or less and 98% had been detained for 12 months or less.

The average period of time for people held in immigration detention facilities has significantly decreased from 277 days in November 2011 to 72 days as at 31 July 2013.





Time in Community Detention

Of the 2773 people in Community Detention as at 31 July 2013 around 1% had been detained for three months or less and 68% had been detained for 12 months or less.
