

Student visa and Temporary Graduate visa program report

at 31 December 2022

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About this report

This report provides bi-annual data about the student visa and temporary graduate visa program administered by the Department of Home Affairs (the department). The report has been produced to assist education providers, representative bodies and policymakers.

Data is sourced from several departmental visa processing and recording systems. Data can be dynamic and there can be delays in transmission of information from the department's global operations. Variations in figures between this report and previous issues can occur. The current financial year should always be considered provisional.

For privacy reasons < 5 has been used where a number in a table is between 1 and 4. Definition of terms

Applicant type: Under the Migration Regulations 1994 (the Regulations), there are two types of

applicants. These are primary applicants and secondary applicants. These terms are

defined below.

If the table or graph heading includes the word 'primary', such as 'primary applications'

or 'primary visa holders', dependants (secondary applicants) are not included.

Citizenship country: The country of citizenship of the visa applicant or visa holder. Where a visa applicant or

visa holder has more than one citizenship country, either the citizenship of the travel

document or the citizenship nominated by the visa applicant is used.

Destination: Where a visa holder has moved from one type of visa to another. This most commonly

occurs where a temporary visa holder applies for a permanent visa. However, many temporary visa holders go on to apply for a further temporary visa. The original visa is determined by the last visa held prior to the destination visa being granted. Destination

visas include visas granted onshore and offshore.

Granted: Unless otherwise specified, the number of visas granted includes primary and review

grants.

In Australia: In this report, refers to the location of the client at the time the application was lodged.

An onshore applicant may already hold a visa of the same kind or may be applying for

another type of visa.

Last visa held: This refers to the last substantive visa held by a visa holder (that is, the last visa other

than a bridging visa) prior to a point in time. The last visa held may have expired or still

be in effect.

Lodged: Lodged is the count of paper applications receipted in a departmental office or

submitted electronically.

Outside Australia: In this report, refers to the location of the client at the time the application was lodged.

Primary applicant: The primary applicant is the person who must satisfy the primary criteria for the grant of

a visa under the Regulations. In this case, it would be the person proposing to study in

Australia.

Primary application:

An application lodged by a primary applicant.

Primary grant:

An outcome where a decision maker (which may include system generated decision

making) makes an assessment based on the initial visa application which results in a

visa being granted to an applicant.

Primary visa holder: A person who has had a primary application for a visa granted.

Secondary applicant: Secondary applicants must satisfy the secondary criteria for the grant of a visa under

the Regulations. In this case, a secondary applicant is generally a dependant of the

primary applicant.

Secondary application: A visa application lodged by a secondary applicant.

Secondary visa holder: A person who has had a secondary application for a visa granted.

Skilled Occupation List: The Medium and Longterm Strategic Skills List (MLTSSL) is a list of skilled occupations

that deliver high value skills needed by the Australian economy and aligns with the national workforce development strategy. It applies to international students who wish to apply for the Graduate Work stream under the Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa. To apply for this stream, students must nominate an occupation on the MLTSSL

and graduate with skills and qualifications that closely relate to this occupation.

Snapshot date: The snapshot date is a point in time at which a count is undertaken. In this report, the

number of visa holders in Australia at a point in time is used.

Visa applicant: Used to refer to clients applying for a visa. Unless otherwise specified, the term covers

both primary and secondary applicants.

Visa holders in Australia: The number of visa holders lawfully in Australia. This is not a count of all valid visas, as

a number of visa holders may be outside Australia on the snapshot date.

Background to the student visa program

International students must have a valid visa for the duration of their studies in Australia. Most international students will need a student visa. However, visitor visas permit up to three months study and working holiday maker visas permit up to four months study. There are seven sectors in which a student visa holder may study:

- English Language Intensive Course for Overseas Students (ELICOS) sector is for international students undertaking a stand-alone English language course that leads to a certificate level award or non-formal award.
- 2) Schools sector is designed for international students applying to study in Australia in a primary, junior secondary or senior secondary school course or an approved secondary school exchange program.
- 3) Vocational Education and Training sector is designed for international students applying to study in Australia and whose main course of study is a certificate, vocational education and training diploma, vocational education and training advanced diploma, vocational graduate certificate or vocational graduate diploma.
- 4) Higher Education sector is designed for international students applying to study in Australia and whose main course of study is a bachelor degree, associate degree, higher education diploma, higher education advanced diploma, graduate certificate, graduate diploma or Masters by coursework.
- 5) Postgraduate Research sector is designed for international students who want to study a Master's degree by research or a Doctoral degree in Australia.
- 6) Non Award sector is designed for international students who want to study non award foundation studies or other full time courses not leading to an Australian award.
- 7) Foreign Affairs or Defence sector is designed for international students who are sponsored by Foreign Affairs or Defence to study a full-time course of any type in Australia.

To be eligible for a student visa, applicants must be accepted for full time study in a course listed on the Commonwealth Register of Institutions and Courses for Overseas Students (CRICOS). Applicants must also meet financial, health insurance, English language proficiency and health and character requirements.

There is no limit on the number of student visas issued each year. If applicants meet requirements, they will be granted a student visa. Student visas are issued for the entire period of study in Australia. Visas are issued in alignment with the period for which the applicant has Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC).

There are two other visas related to the student visa program, the Student Guardian visa and the Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa. The Student Guardian visa is for individuals who wish to accompany and care for minors studying in Australia. The Temporary Graduate visa allows international students to live and work in Australia temporarily after they have finished their studies.

Family members

Students can apply to have partners and dependant children under the age of eighteen accompany them to Australia. These family members are known as secondary visa holders and are counted in student visa numbers. A parent or guardian seeking to accompany an international student to Australia may be eligible for a Student Guardian visa.

Background to the student visa program - continued

Ability to work

Student visas include a visa condition that, once the course has commenced, allows most students to work for up to 40 hours per fortnight while their course is in session and for unlimited hours during course breaks. The limitation imposed by this visa condition reflects the purpose of a student visa; that it is to allow entry to Australia in order to study, not to work. Secondary visa holders are subject to a visa condition that limits them to 40 hours work per fortnight at any time.

Higher degree by research students on a Postgraduate Research visa may work unlimited hours once their Masters or PhD course has commenced. Dependants of students studying a Masters or PhD research course have no limitation on their work hours.

Simplified student visa framework (SSVF)

On 1 July 2016 the SSVF was implemented replacing both Streamlined Visa Processing arrangements and the Assessment Level Framework. Key changes under the SSVF include:

- international students apply for a single Student visa (subclass 500) regardless of their chosen course of study
- student guardians apply for the new Student Guardian visa (subclass 590)
- a single immigration risk framework apply to all international students
- all students and student guardians are required to lodge their visa application online through ImmiAccount

Financial requirements

Students and their families need to be aware of the costs involved in studying and living in Australia. In order to meet the financial requirements for the grant of a student visa, applicants must be able to demonstrate that they have access to sufficient funds to cover tuition fees, travel costs, educational costs for any accompanying school age children and living costs for the full study period.

Genuine temporary entrant (GTE) requirement

The GTE requirement was introduced on 5 November 2011 to enhance the integrity of the student visa program.

The GTE requirement explicitly addresses whether the individual circumstances of an applicant indicate that their intention is for a temporary stay in Australia.

Factors that the department may consider as part of the GTE requirement are set out in a Ministerial Direction available at http://www.homeaffairs.gov.au/StudyinginAustralia/Documents/direction-no-69.pdf and include:

- circumstances in the applicant's home country;
- the applicant's potential circumstances in Australia;
- the applicant's immigration history;
- the value of the course to the applicant's future; and/or
- any other matter relevant to the applicant's intention to stay temporarily.

Background to the student visa program - continued

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Overseas students must have health insurance for the duration of their stay in Australia. The OSHC assists international students to meet the costs of medical and hospital care that they may need while in Australia.

Visa refusals

A decision to refuse a student visa application is made when the delegate of the Minister is not satisfied that the applicant meets the legal criteria for grant of a visa. When refusing a visa application, the department provides an applicant, or their agent, with a written decision record that sets out the reason for the decision.

Background to the subclass 485 visa

The Skilled Graduate (Subclass 485) visa was renamed the Temporary Graduate (Subclass 485) visa on 23 March 2013, and has become a key component of the Student Temporary Visa Program. Previously, the Subclass 485 visa was a component of the Skilled Migration Program.

The Temporary Graduate visa has two streams, the Graduate Work stream and the Post-Study Work stream:

- Graduate Work stream for international students who have recently graduated with the skills and qualifications that relate to an occupation on the Skilled Occupations List. Applicants in this stream must have completed a trade qualification, diploma or degree. Successful applicants are granted a visa of 18 months validity. Holders of a Hong Kong Special Administrative Region passports are granted a visa of five years duration.
- Post-Study Work stream for international students who have recently graduated with an Australian Bachelor degree, Masters degree or Doctorate from an Australian educational institution. This stream is only available to international students who applied for, and were granted, their first student visa on or after 5 November 2011. Successful applicants are granted a visa of two, three or four years duration, depending on the highest educational qualification they have obtained. Holders of a Hong Kong Special Administrative Region passports are granted a visa of five years duration.
- Second Post-Study Work stream From 20 January 2021, eligible holders of a 485 Post-Study Work stream visa can apply for a second 485 Post-Study Work stream. This visa is for international students who completed studies in a regional area and continued to reside in the regional area as the holder of the first 485 Post-Study Work stream. Successful applicants are granted a visa of one or two years duration depending upon which regional area they studied and reside in.

This visa provides eligible graduates with the opportunity to gain practical work experience in Australia following their studies. Eligible visas

To be eligible for the Temporary Graduate visa, graduates must have completed their studies in Australia while on an eligible student visa.

Australian study requirement

The Australian study requirement is defined as study in Australia in a course registered on the Commonwealth Register of Institutions and Courses for Overseas Students (CRICOS) for a period of at least two academic years (92 weeks). The course should be conducted in English and should be completed in no less than 16 calendar months. All Temporary Graduate visa applicants must meet the Australian study requirement in the six months immediately prior to lodging their visa application. Family members

Family members must meet legislative requirements and must provide evidence of their relationship to the Temporary Graduate visa applicant. Additionally, family members can apply to join the Temporary Graduate visa holder in Australia after the Temporary Graduate visa has been granted. Ability to work and study

There are no restrictions on the type of work a Temporary Graduate visa holder can do. Temporary Graduate visa holders may work or study in any field, regardless of their study and qualifications. Dependents and secondary applicants are able to work and study on the Temporary Graduate visa.

It is the responsibility of the Temporary Graduate visa holder to seek their own employment if they are granted the visa. The Australian government is not responsible for arranging employment.

Executive Summary

Key Points

- To deliver the Australian Government priority to reduce visa backlogs and improve visa processing times, the Department finalised more than 342,000 student visa applications between 1 July and December 2022.
- In the period from 1 July to 31 December 2022, the Department reduced the number of student visa applications on hand by 65 per cent from 144,565 on 30 June 2022 to 49,816 on 31 December 2022.
- This visa backlog reduction was achieved while managing a rapid increase in the number of visa applications lodged. In the period from 1 July to 31 December 2022, there were 247,230 student visa applications lodged, including 179,069 applications lodged by applicants located outside Australia.
- An increase in visa processing times during the reporting period reflects processing of new and older student visa applications as the Department continued to reduce on hand cases. As these older applications are finalised, published processing times may initially increase, but will then improve.
- Processing times for student visa applications lodged outside Australia were faster than those lodged in Australia. This reflects the Department's focus on finalising applications from international students seeking to travel to Australia and commence their studies.

1 Applications lodged

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 247,230 student visa applications lodged – an increase of 109 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22 (118,353 applications lodged).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 179,069 student visa applications lodged by applicants outside Australia – an increase of 222 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22 (55,628 applications lodged).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, visa applications lodged outside Australia for the Higher Education Sector and Vocational Education and Training (VET) Sector increased by 145 per cent (to 97,712) and 330 per cent (to 32,921) respectively when compared with the same period in 2021-22. Applications lodged outside Australia for the English Language Intensive Courses for Overseas Students (ELICOS) Sector increased by 809 per cent (to 29,317).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 68,161 student visa applications lodged from applicants in Australia – an increase of 8.7 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22 (62,725 applications lodged).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, the top five source countries for student visa lodgements were India (43,925), China (38,701), Nepal (18,405), Colombia (13,321) and Philippines (11,879). Lodgements from citizens of these five countries increased by 80.2 percent

(India), 52.6 per cent (China), 74.2 per cent (Nepal), 320 per cent (Colombia) and 198 per cent (Philippines) when compared with the same period in 2021-22.

2 Visas granted

There is no cap on the number of student visas granted.

In first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 283,573 student visas granted – an increase of 203 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22 (93,654 visas granted).

The number of visa grants increased across all sectors during the first half of the 2022-23 program year. Visa grants increased by 179 per cent in the VET Sector, 150 per cent in the Higher Education Sector, 2,010 per cent in the ELICOS sector and 93 per cent in the Postgraduate Research Sector when compared with the same period in 2021-22.

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 166,891 visas granted to applicants outside Australia – an increase of 309 per cent compared with the same period in 2021-22 (40,744 visas granted). There were 116,682 visas granted to applicants in Australia – an increase of 121 per cent when compared with same period in 2021-22 (52,880 visas granted).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, the top five source countries for visa grants were India (52,159), China (42,742), Nepal (21,587), Colombia (18,318) and Brazil (12,745). Visa grants to citizens of these five countries increased by 199 per cent (India), 97.5 per cent (China), 159 per cent (Nepal), 862.6 per cent, (Colombia) and 474 per cent (Brazil).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, the number of visas granted to applicants located outside Australia increased by 442 per cent (to 22,400) in the VET Sector, by 188 per cent to (92,010) in the Higher Education Sector and by 3,017 per cent (to 34,068) in the ELICOS Sector when compared with the same period in 2021-22.

3 Grant rates

The grant rates have been provided on a quarterly basis. This breakdown allows readers to identify and monitor changes in grant rates by sector and nationality across the reporting period.

A grant rate is the percentage of grants compared to the number of decisions made.

The grant rate for student visas in the 1 October 2022 to 31 December 2022 quarter was 87.6 per cent.

The grant rate for applicants outside Australia in the 1 October 2022 to 31 December 2022 quarter was 76.5 per cent.

In the 1 October 2022 to 31 December 2022 quarter, the grant rate for applicants located outside Australia was 81.5 per cent in the Higher Education Sector - compared to 96.7 per cent for the same period in 2021-22. The grant rate for applicants located outside Australia was 45.5 per cent in the VET Sector compared to 71.1 per cent for the same period 2021-22.

4 Processing times

The time required to process student visa applications depends on many factors including the supporting evidence provided by the applicant.

In the 1 October 2022 to 31 December 2022 quarter, 75 per cent of all student visa applications were processed within 137 calendar days and 50 per cent were processed within 42 days. In the 1 October 2022 to 31 December 2022 quarter, 75 per cent of all student visa applications lodged outside Australia were processed within 32 calendar days.

5 Applications on hand

On 31 December 2022, there were 39,963 primary student visa applications on hand, down from 120,193 applications on hand on 30 June 2022. Of the total primary applications on hand, 30,566 applications were lodged by applicants outside Australia and 9,397 applications were lodged by applicants in Australia.

6 Visa holders in Australia

On 31 December 2022, there were 456,970 student visa holders in Australia. This is an increase of 44.6 per cent when compared to the 315,949 student visa holders in Australia on 31 December 2021.

Of the total student visa holders in Australia on 31 December 2022, 82,281 were from India, 73,826 were from China and 55,998 were from Nepal, 20,683 were from Colombia and 18,616 were from Thailand. Students from these five countries accounted for more than half (55 per cent) of all student visa holders in Australia.

7 Destinations

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 160,303 former student visa holders granted another substantive visa (other than a student visa in the same sector) – an increase of 171 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22.

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, most of the former student visa holders who were granted another substantive visa moved on to a Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa (53.6 per cent), a Student visa in a new sector (14.4 per cent), or a Temporary Activity (subclass 408) visa (10.9 per cent).

8 Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 52,536 Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa applications lodged – an increase of 10 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22 (47,765 applications lodged).

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, lodgements in the Post-Study Work stream decreased by 10.8 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22. Applications lodged in the Graduate Work stream increased by 86.9 per cent when compared with the same period in 2021-22.

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, visa grants increased by 203 per cent when compared with same period in 2021-22. On 31 December 2022, there were 17,433 Temporary Graduate visa applications on hand, down from 46,461 on 31 December 2021.

On 31 December 2022, there were 144,694 Temporary Graduate visa holders in Australia, which was 51.9 per cent higher than on 31 December 2021, when there were 95,259 Temporary Graduate visa holders in Australia.

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, there were 46,250 former Temporary Graduate visa holders granted another substantive visa – an increase of 178 per cent compared with the same period in 2021-22.

In the first half of the 2022-23 program year, most former Temporary Graduate visa holders who were granted another substantive visa moved on to a Temporary Activity (subclass 408) visa (39.1 per cent), a Student (subclass 500) visa (18.7 per cent), a Skilled – Nominated (subclass 190) visa (14.2 per cent) or a Temporary Skill Shortage (subclass 482) visa (6.7 per cent).


1.01 Number of student visa applications lodged by month - year on year 12 months rolling total




1.02 Number of student visa applications lodged in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by month - comparison with previous four financial years




1.03 Number of student visa applications lodged by month where the client was In Australia - year on year 12 months rolling total



1.04 Number of student visa applications lodged in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by month where the client was In Australia - comparison with previous four financial years




1.05 Number of student visa applications lodged by month where the client was Outside Australia - year on year 12 months rolling total



1.08 Number of student visa applications lodged for Higher Education Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years




1.09 Number of student visa applications lodged for Independent ELICOS Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years





1.10 Number of student visa applications lodged for Non-Award Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years







1.12 Number of student visa applications lodged for Schools Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years






1.14 Number of student visa applications lodged in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by citizenship country - comparison with same period in previous year



1.16 Number of student visa applications lodged in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 where the client was Outside Australia by citizenship country - comparison with same period in previous year




2.01 Number of student visa applications granted by month - year on year 12 months rolling total



2.02 Number of student visa applications granted in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by month - comparison with previous four financial years




2.03 Number of student visa applications granted by month where the client was In Australia - year on year 12 months rolling total

2.05 Number of student visa applications granted by month where the client was Outside Australia - year on year 12 months rolling total




2.06 Number of student visa applications granted in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by month where the client was Outside Australia- comparison with previous four financial years


2.08 Number of visa applications granted for Higher Education Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years

2.10 Number of visa applications granted for Non-Award Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years




2.11 Number of visa applications granted for Postgraduate Research Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years




2.12 Number of visa applications granted for Schools Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years




2.13 Number of visa applications granted for Vocational Education and Training Sector in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by client location and month - comparison with previous four financial years




2.14 Number of student visa applications granted in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by citizenship country - comparison with same period in previous year




3.02 Grant rate of student visa applications decided in the three month period between 1 September 2022 and 30 November 2022 by sector and client location



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


5.02 Number of student PRIMARY visa applications on hand at 31 December 2022 by client location and visa subclass





5.04 Number of student PRIMARY visa applications on hand at 31 December 2022 by citizenship country and client location - top 15 citizenship countries




6.01 Number of student visa holders at the end of each month in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by month - comparison with previous three financial years




6.02 Number of student PRIMARY visa holders in Australia at the end of each month in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 - comparison with previous three financial years

6.04 Number of student visa holders in Australia as at 31 December 2022 by sector / visa subclass - comparison with the same date in the previous year





6.05 Number of student visa holders in Australia as at 31 December 2022 by citizenship country - comparison with the same date in the previous year




6.06 Number of student visa holders in Australia as at 31 December 2022 by sector / visa subclass and applicant type







8.03 Number of subclass 485 visa applications lodged in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by citizenship country comparison with same period in previous year







8.08 Number of subclass 485 PRIMARY visa applications on hand at 31 December 2022 by visa stream








8.12 Number of visas granted in 2022-23 to 31 December 2022 by visa category where the last visa held was a subclass 485 visa - comparison with same period in previous year
