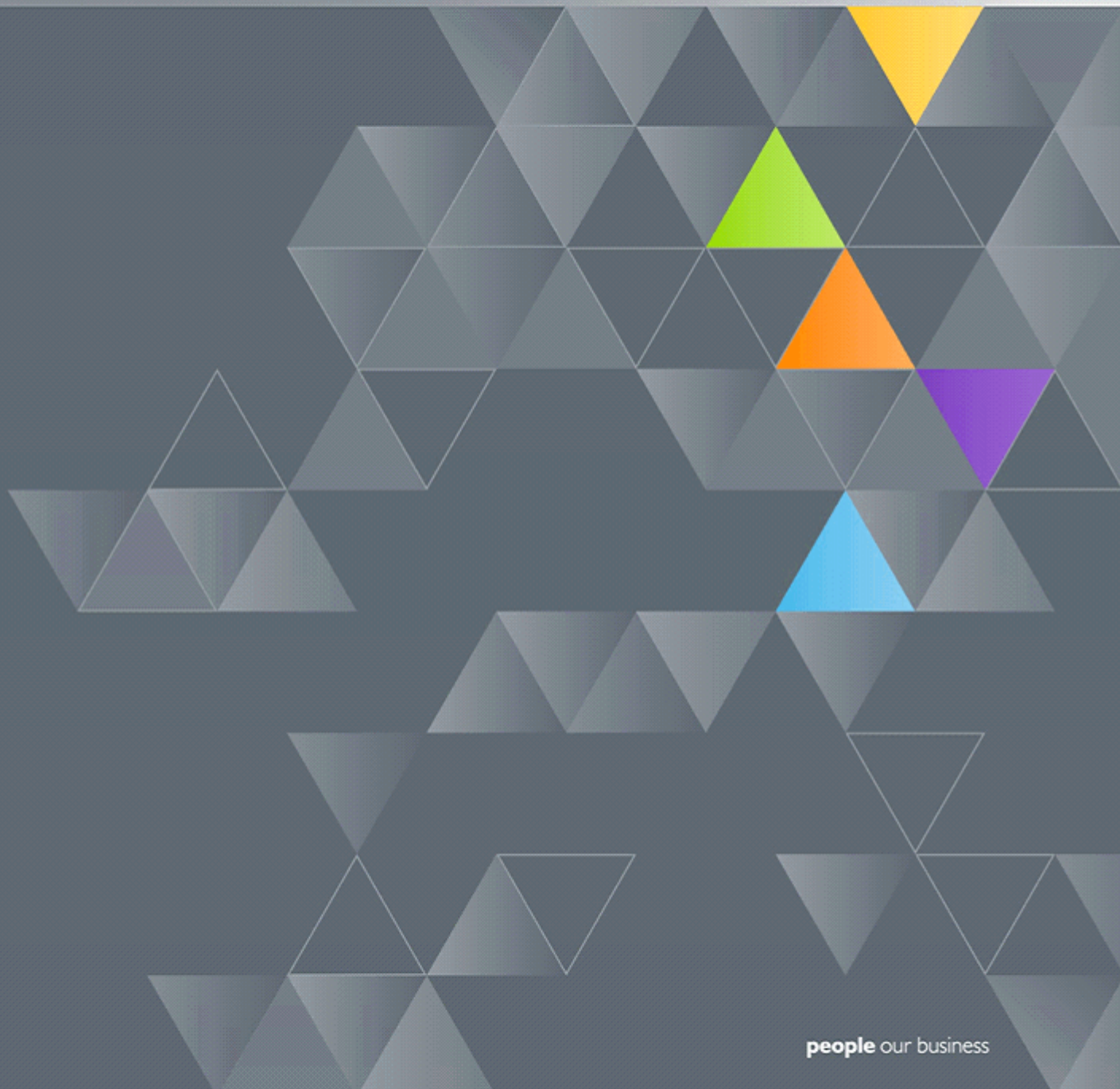

# Temporary entrants and New Zealand citizens in Australia

As at 30 September 2014

## Background

The number of temporary entrants and New Zealand citizens physically present in Australia is estimated every three months by identifying those persons who have entered Australia on temporary visas or as New Zealand citizens, and who have neither left Australia nor been granted permanent residence. This data provides useful point-in-time information on temporary entrants. It gives a more accurate picture of the population impact of Australia's temporary entry programs than data on the flow of temporary entrants in and out of Australia.

The number of temporary entrants in this report are broken down by the following categories:

### *Visitor visa holders*

non-permanent entrants to Australia whose visa is for tourism, short stay business, visiting relatives or medical treatment;

### *Student visa holders*

overseas students who undertake full-time study in registered courses. In this report, Student Guardian (subclass 580) visa holders are included in 'other temporary visa holders' and not in the 'student visa holders' category;

### *Working holiday maker visa holders*

young adults from countries with reciprocal bilateral agreements with Australia who holiday in Australia and undertake short-term work and/or study and who hold a Working Holiday (subclass 417) or Work and Holiday (subclass 462) visa;

### *Temporary skilled visa holders*

Temporary Work (Skilled) subclass 457 visa holders mostly recruited by Australian companies whose visa is valid for up to four years;

### *Temporary graduate visa holders*

overseas students who wish to remain in Australia for up to 18 months to gain skilled work experience or improve their English language skills and who hold a Temporary Graduate (subclass 485) visa;

### *Bridging visa holders*

non-citizens who are provided with lawful status while they have business with the government or the courts regarding immigration matters;

### *Other temporary visa holders*

include holders of other temporary visas such as New Zealand Citizen Family Relationships (non-New Zealand citizens who are family members of a New Zealand citizen), social/cultural (Entertainment, Sport, Visiting Academic, Religious Worker, etc), international relations (Diplomatic, Exchange, Domestic Worker, etc), training (Occupational Trainee and Professional Development), Student Guardian and transit visas;

### *New Zealand visa holders*

New Zealand citizens granted a Special Category Visa (subclass 444) on arrival in Australia. It should be noted that a small number of New Zealand citizens who were holding a temporary visa other than subclass 444 are included in the temporary visa category relating to the visa held.

## Rounding in reported data

Figures given in this report are rounded to the nearest ten. Percentage changes are calculated from unrounded numbers. This may result in minor discrepancies from results calculated from rounded numbers.

## Reporting of primary and secondary visa holders

Figures given in this report include both primary and secondary visa holders.

# Executive summary

## Total temporary entrants and New Zealand citizens snapshot

There were 1 769 490 temporary entrants and New Zealand citizens in Australia on 30 September 2014, compared with 1 732 180 on 30 September 2013 (an increase of 2.2 per cent).

## Temporary visa holders

The number of temporary visa holders, that is excluding New Zealand citizens on Special Category (subclass 444) visas and bridging visa holders, was 1 017 440 on 30 September 2014 compared to 972 000 on 30 September 2013, an increase of 4.7 per cent.

## Quarterly comparison

Compared with 30 June 2014, the end of the previous quarter, the number of temporary visa holders as at 30 September 2014 is an increase of 7.7 per cent from 944 360 to 1 017 440.

The percentage change in the major components from 30 June 2014 to 30 September 2014 was:

- Visitor visa holders an increase of 12.2 per cent;
- Student visa holders an increase of 14.1 per cent;
- Working holiday maker visa holders an increase of 0.0 per cent;
- Temporary skilled visa holders an increase of 0.9 per cent;
- Temporary graduate visa holders a decrease of 12.8 per cent;
- Other temporary visa holders an increase of 5.7 per cent.

## Visitor visa holders

The number of visitor visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 226 010, an increase of 12.7 per cent compared with 200 590 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of visitor visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- China (excl SARs) 48 940 visa holders, an increase of 28.2 per cent from 30 September 2013
- India 28 000 visa holders, an increase of 21.8 per cent
- United Kingdom 24 290 visa holders, an increase of 0.9 per cent
- United States of America 12 090 visa holders, an increase of 2.2 per cent
- Malaysia 9 370 visa holders, an increase of 7.7 per cent

## Student visa holders

The number of student visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 387 800, an increase of 11.8 per cent compared with 346 970 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of student visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- China (excl SARs) 95 420 visa holders, an increase of 9.0 per cent from 30 September 2013
- India 44 790 visa holders, an increase of 38.2 per cent
- Vietnam 21 120 visa holders, an increase of 13.2 per cent
- South Korea 16 780 visa holders, a decrease of 0.3 per cent
- Malaysia 16 620 visa holders, an increase of 2.3 per cent

## Working holiday maker visa holders

The number of working holiday maker visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 151 220, a decrease of 9.0 per cent compared with 166 260 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of working holiday maker visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- United Kingdom 28 890 visa holders, a decrease of 2.4 per cent from 30 September 2013
- Taiwan 23 120 visa holders, a decrease of 15.2 per cent
- South Korea 18 130 visa holders, a decrease of 24.3 per cent
- France 13 610 visa holders, an increase of 3.1 per cent
- Germany 13 340 visa holders, a decrease of 6.7 per cent

## Executive summary - continued

### Temporary skilled visa holders

The number of temporary skilled (subclass 457) visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 196 930, an increase of 0.2 per cent compared with 196 450 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of temporary skilled visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- United Kingdom 39 260 visa holders, a decrease of 13.3 per cent from 30 September 2013
- India 38 250 visa holders, an increase of 17.6 per cent
- Ireland 16 090 visa holders, a decrease of 13.8 per cent
- Philippines 13 590 visa holders, an increase of 3.4 per cent
- China (excl SARs) 10 290 visa holders, an increase of 27.0 per cent

### Temporary graduate visa holders

The number of temporary graduate (subclass 485) visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 21 970, a decrease of 27.6 per cent compared with 30 350 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of temporary graduate visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- China (excl SARs) 6 720 visa holders, an increase of 17.3 per cent from 30 September 2013
- India 3 550 visa holders, a decrease of 59.9 per cent
- Nepal 2 170 visa holders, a decrease of 1.1 per cent
- Pakistan 1 080 visa holders, a decrease of 3.7 per cent
- Malaysia 850 visa holders, a decrease of 33.2 per cent

### Other temporary visa holders

The number of other temporary visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 33 510, an increase of 6.7 per cent compared with 31 390 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of other temporary visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- United Kingdom 5 220 visa holders, a decrease of 0.6 per cent from 30 September 2013
- China (excl SARs) 3 450 visa holders, an increase of 14.5 per cent
- United States of America 2 950 visa holders, an increase of 3.4 per cent
- India 1 770 visa holders, an increase of 19.9 per cent
- South Korea 1 300 visa holders, a decrease of 2.7 per cent

### Bridging visa holders

The number of bridging visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 94 840, a decrease of 15.3 per cent compared with 111 980 on 30 September 2013.

The five countries with the largest number of bridging visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 were:

- India 14 370 visa holders, a decrease of 22.9 per cent from 30 September 2013
- China (excl SARs) 10 190 visa holders, an increase of 9.2 per cent
- United Kingdom 5 700 visa holders, an increase of 5.1 per cent
- Sri Lanka 5 460 visa holders, an increase of 43.0 per cent
- Pakistan 4 220 visa holders, an increase of 24.5 per cent

### New Zealand visa holders

The number of New Zealand (subclass 444) visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 657 210, an increase of 1.4 per cent compared with 648 200 on 30 September 2013.

# Total temporary entrants

## Annual comparison

An estimated 1 769 490 temporary entrants were present in Australia on 30 September 2014, compared with 1 732 180 on 30 September 2013, an increase of 2.2 per cent over the period.

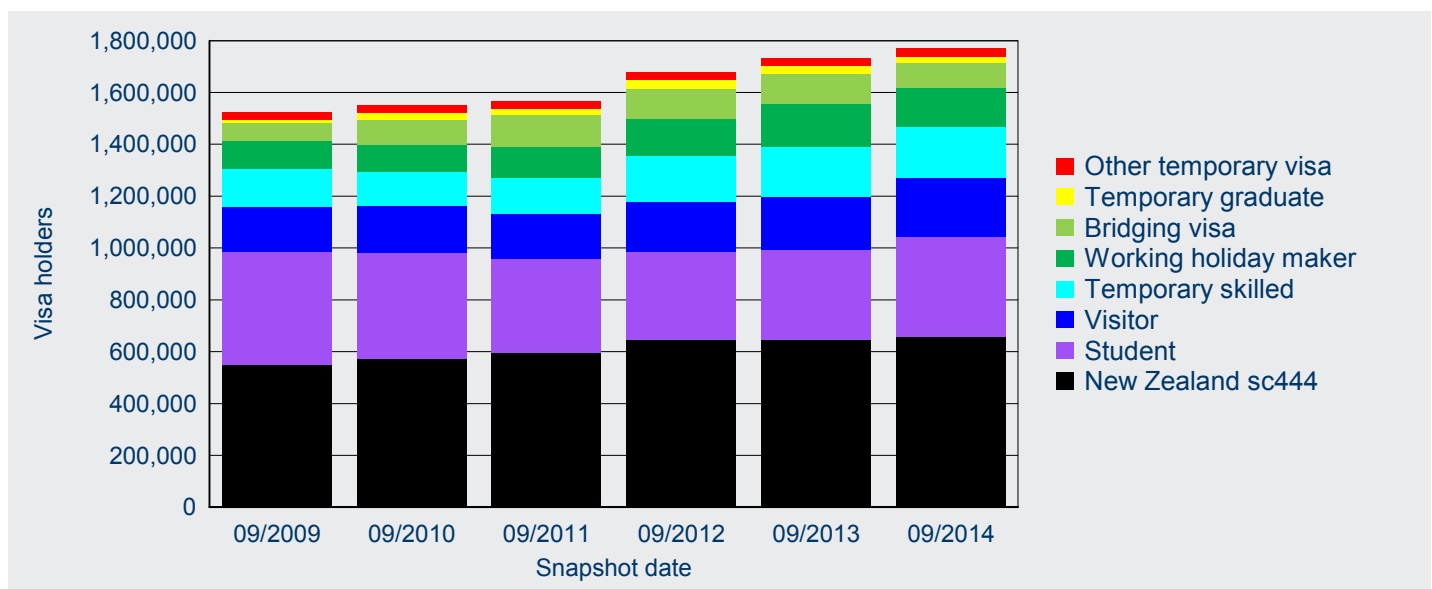
The three largest components in Australia on 30 September 2014 were New Zealand visa holders (657 210 visa holders and 37.1 per cent of the total), student visa holders (387 800 / 21.9 per cent) and visitor visa holders (226 010 / 12.8 per cent).

Of the major components, the number of visitor visa holders increased by 12.7 per cent from 30 September 2013, student visa holders increased by 11.8 per cent and other temporary visa holders increased by 6.7 per cent.

Figure 1: Temporary entrants in Australia - annual historical series

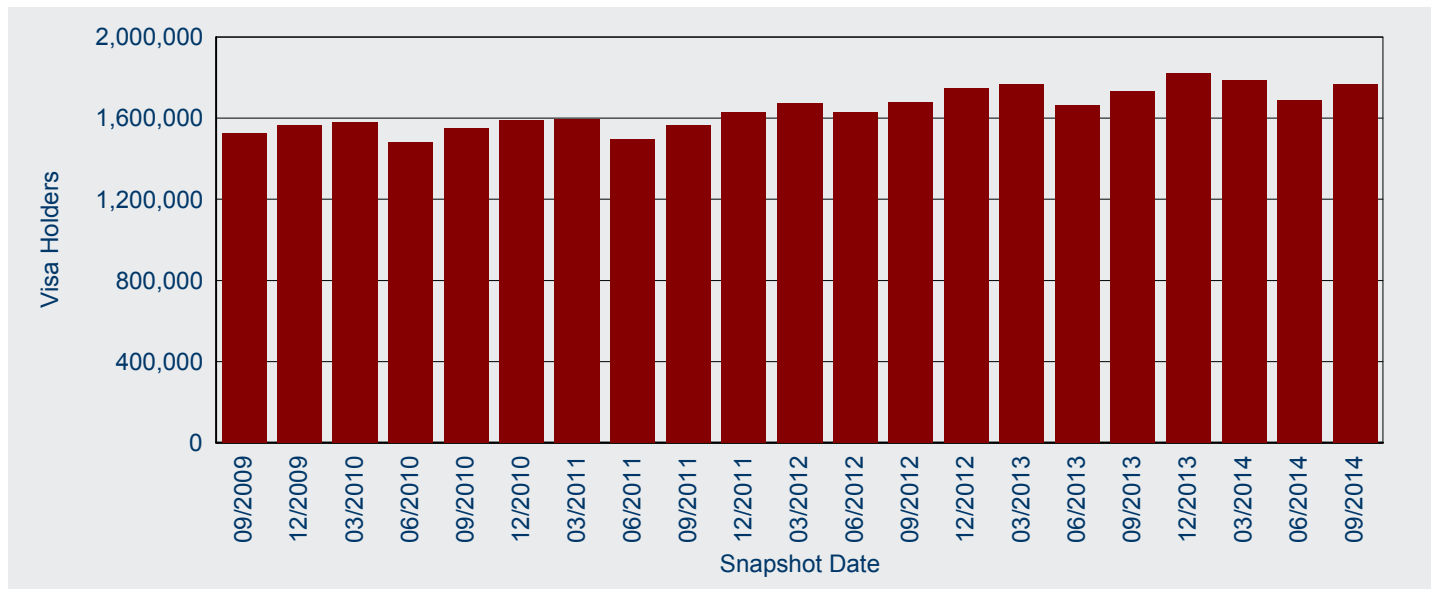

### Quarterly comparison

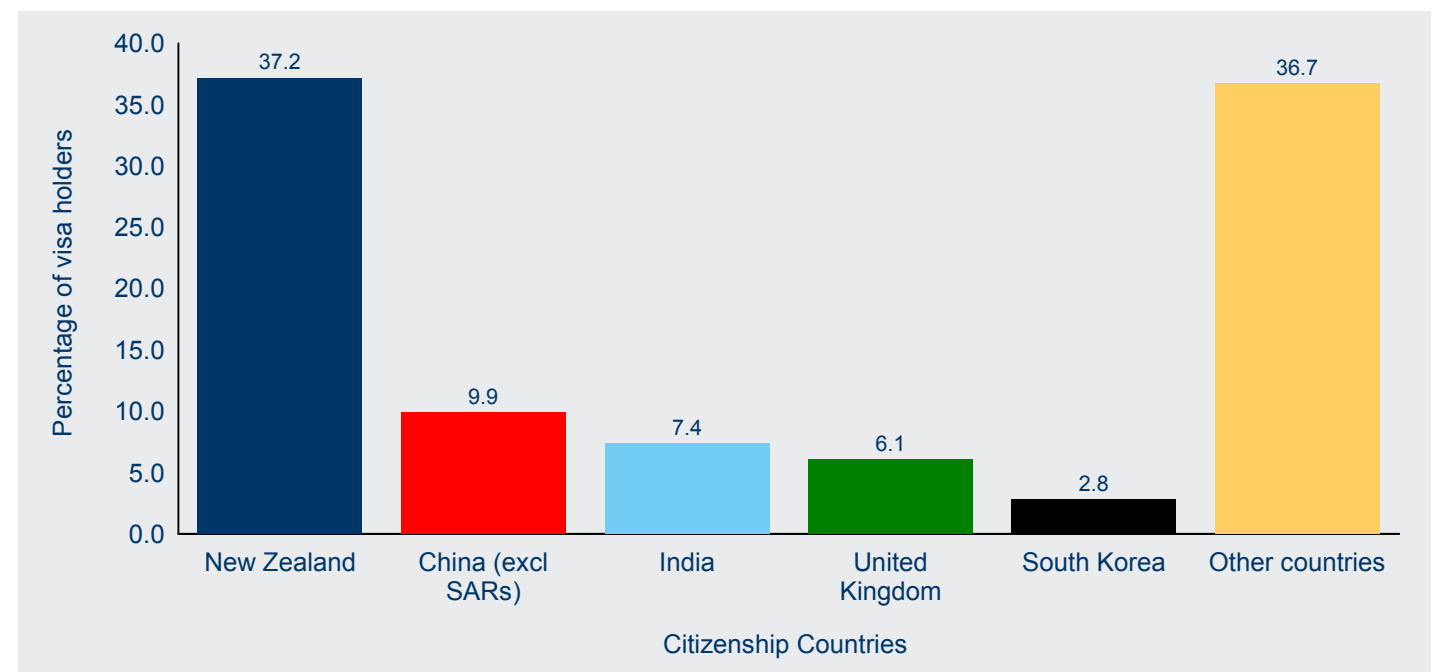
The total number of temporary entrants in Australia on 30 September 2014 was 1 769 490, an increase of 4.8 per cent compared with 1 688 070 on 30 June 2014 (Figure 2). Of the major components, the number of New Zealand visa holders increased by 1.3 per cent from 30 June 2014, student visa holders increased by 14.1 per cent and visitor visa holders increased by 12.2 per cent.

The top source citizenship country for temporary entrants in Australia on 30 September 2014 was New Zealand (657 440 visa holders), followed by China (excl SARs) (175 000), India (130 730), United Kingdom (107 210) and South Korea (49 570) (Figure 3).

Figure 3: Temporary entrants in Australia - percentage of top five citizenship countries

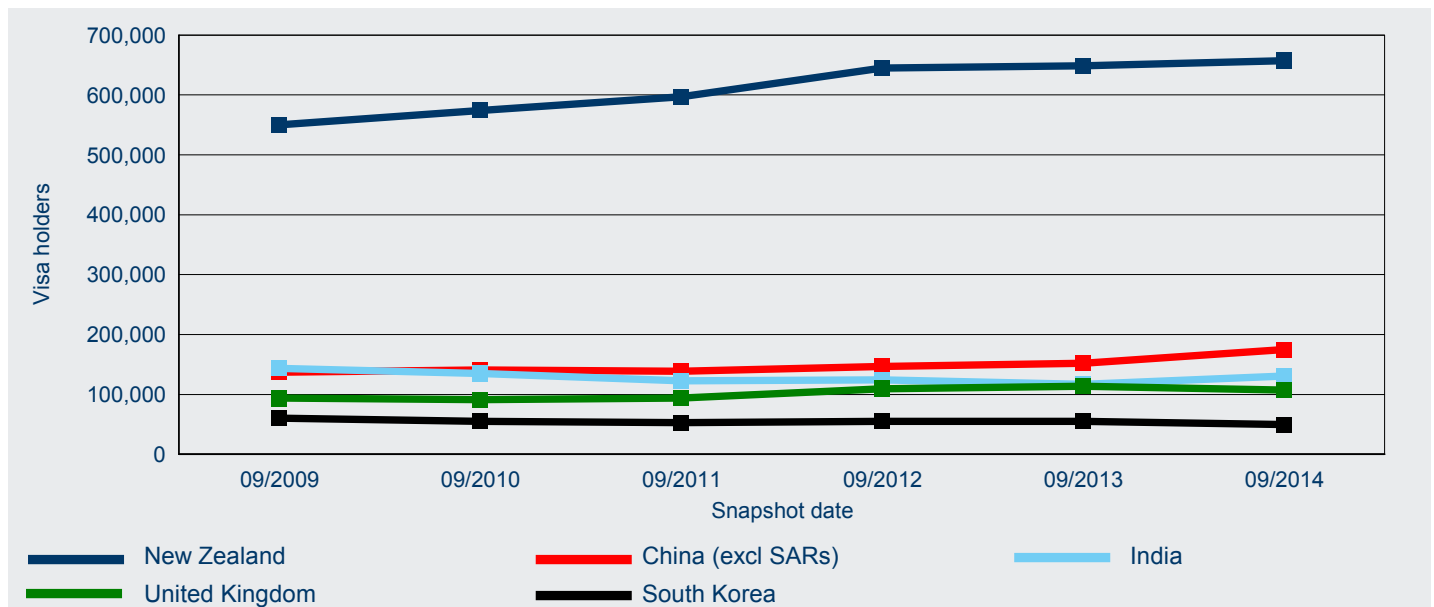




## Total temporary entrants - continued

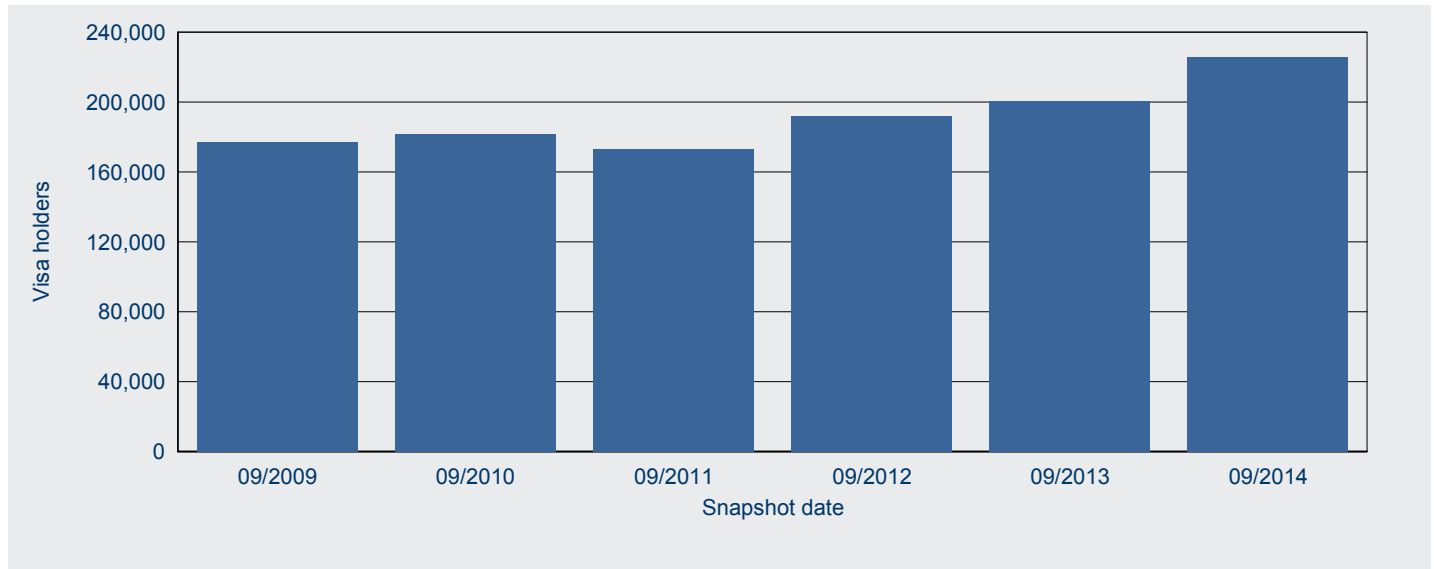
Figure 4: Temporary entrants in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

When comparing the number of temporary entrants in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 4 shows that over the past five years, the number of temporary entrants from New Zealand increased by 19.5 per cent from 30 September 2009, China (excl SARs) increased by 27.8 per cent, India decreased by 8.9 per cent, United Kingdom increased by 14.4 per cent and South Korea decreased by 17.6 per cent.

## Visitor visa holders

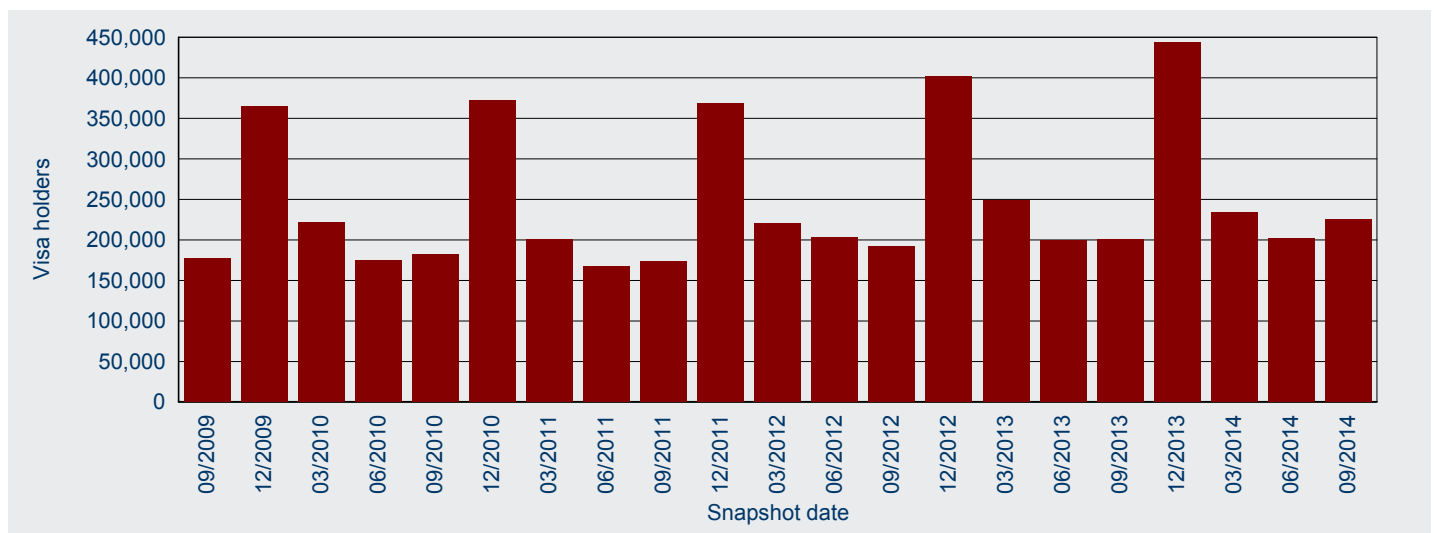

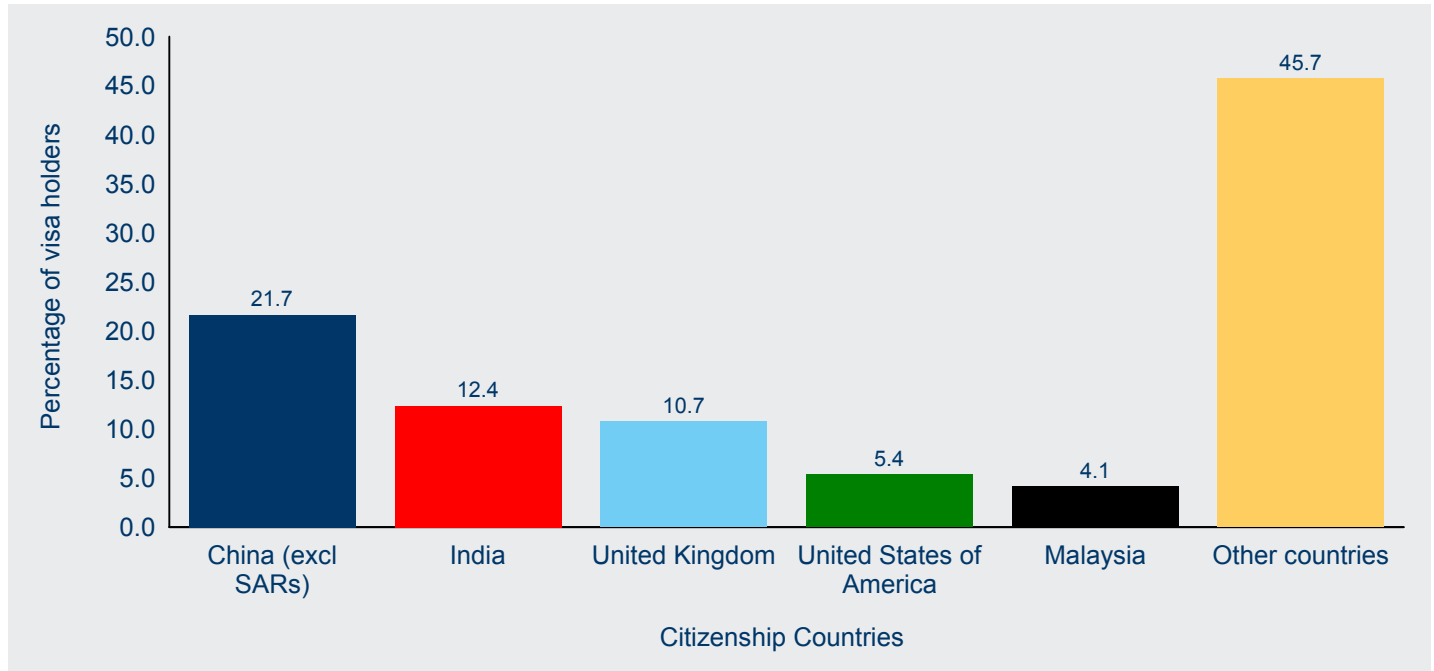
Figure 6: Visitor visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

There were 226 010 visitor visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014. This represents an increase of 12.7 per cent when compared with 200 590 on 30 September 2013 (Figures 5 and 6).

In the past five years, the quarter with the highest number of visitor visa holders in Australia was 31 December 2013 with 444 140 visa holders (Figure 6).

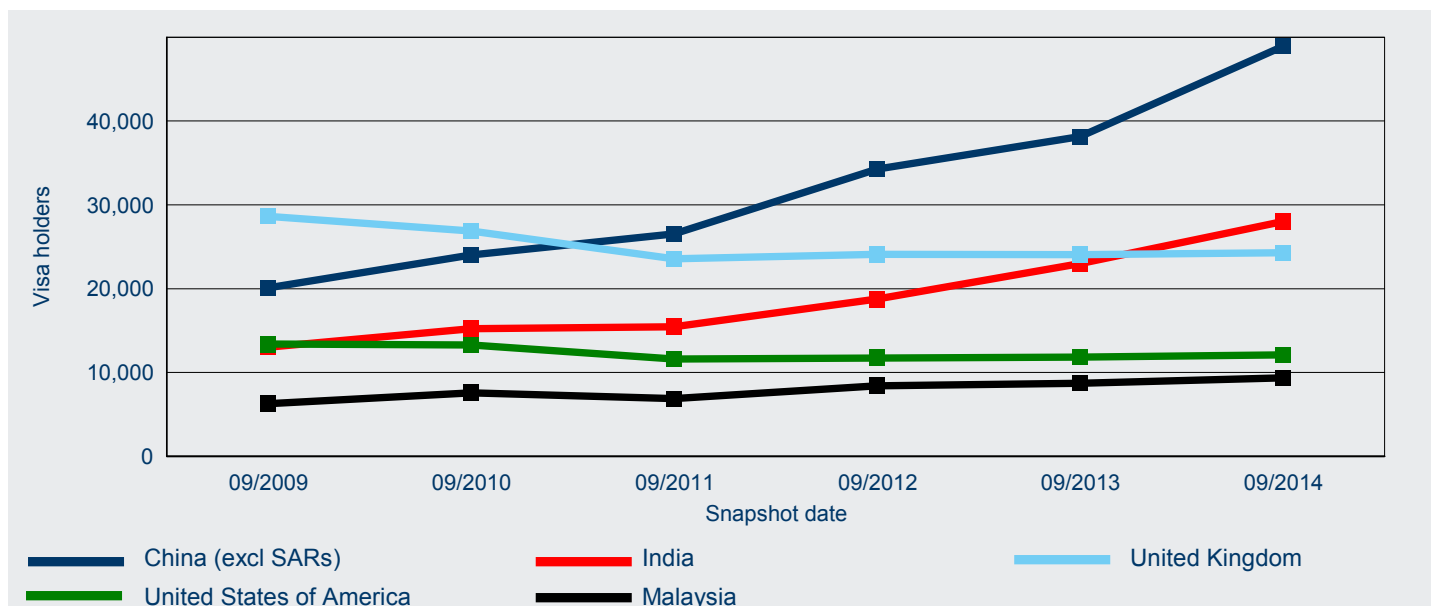
The top source citizenship country for visitor visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was China (excl SARs) (48 940 visa holders), followed by India (28 000), United Kingdom (24 290), United States of America (12 090) and Malaysia (9 370) (Figure 7).

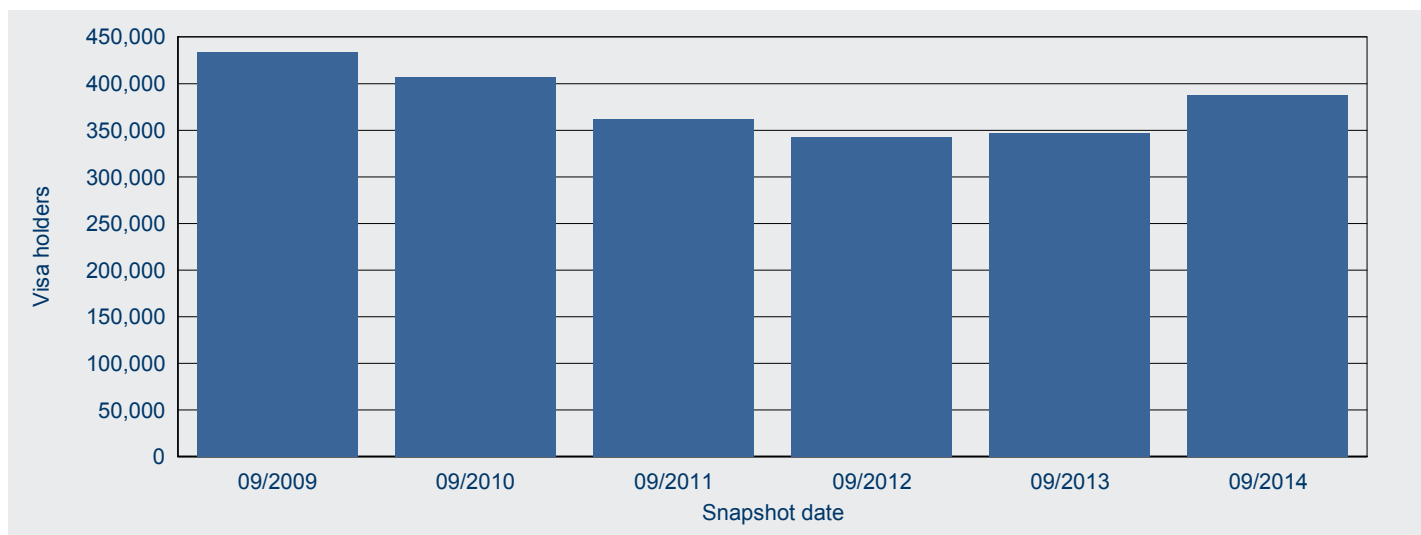
Figure 8: Visitor visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

When comparing the number of visitor visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 8 shows that over the past five years, the number of visitor visa holders from China (excl SARs) increased by 143.4 per cent from 30 September 2009, India increased by 114.9 per cent, United Kingdom decreased by 15.1 per cent, United States of America decreased by 9.6 per cent and Malaysia increased by 48.9 per cent.

## Student visa holders

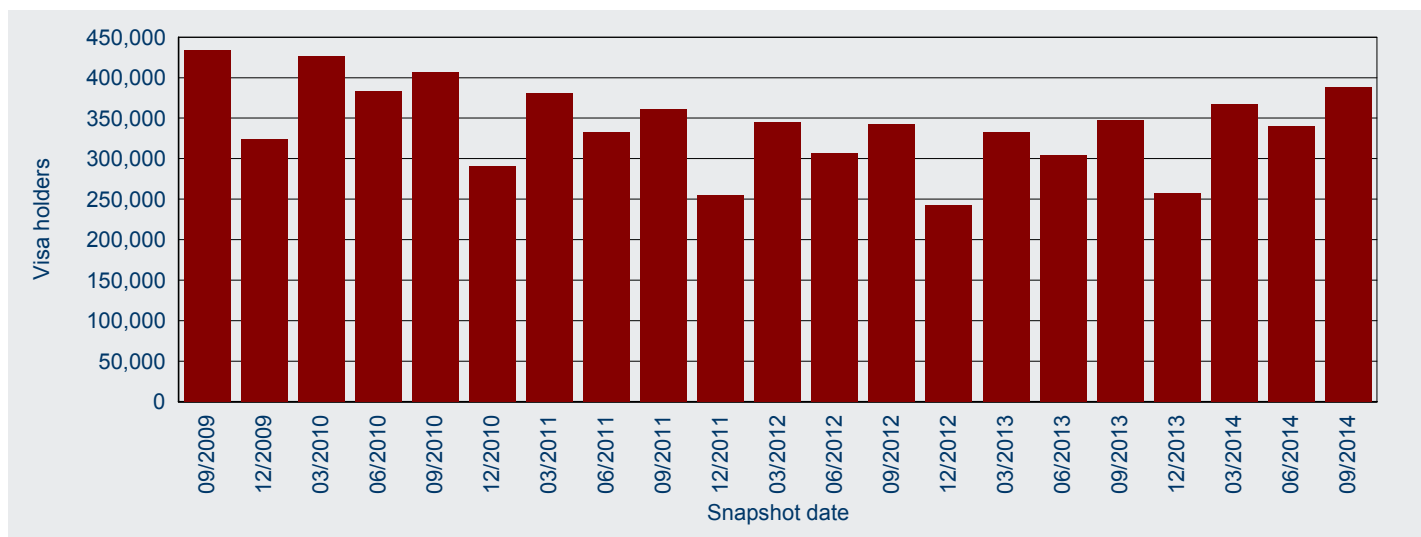
There were 387 800 student visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014. This represents an increase of 11.8 per cent when compared with 346 970 on 30 September 2013 (Figure 9).

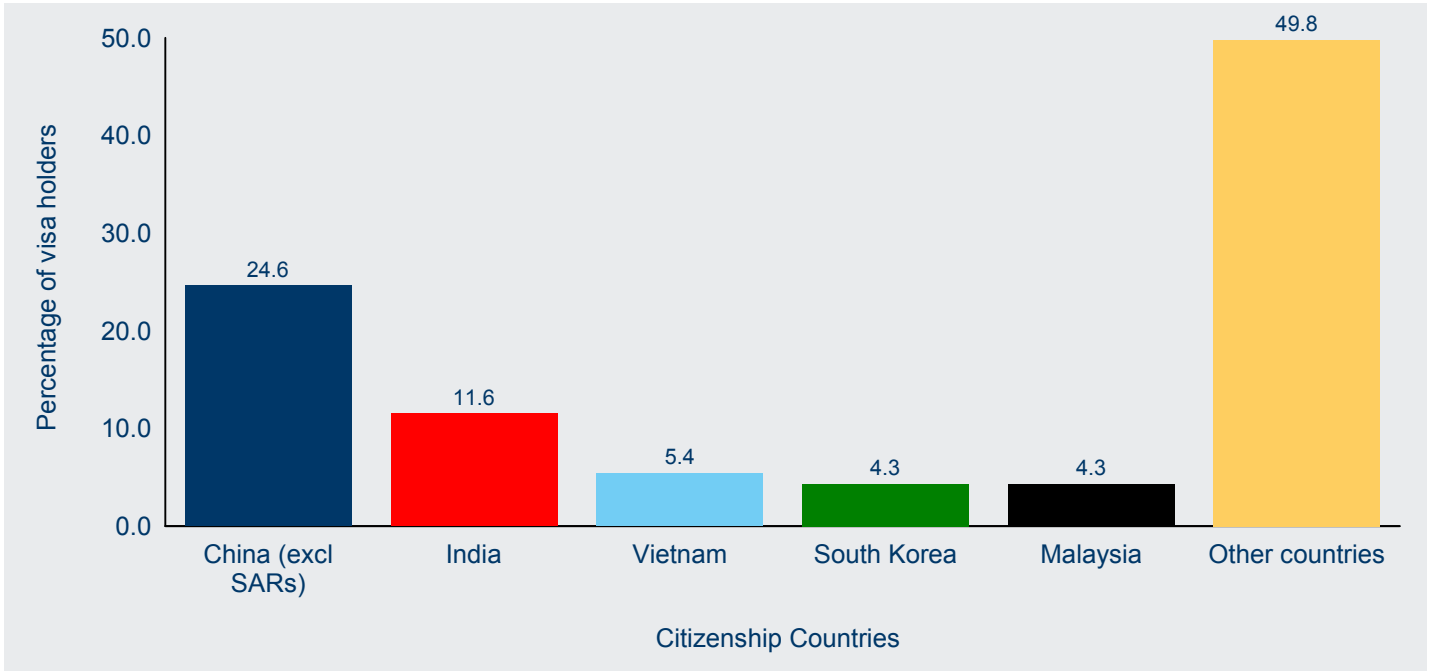
Figure 10: Student visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

In the past five years, the quarter with the highest number of student visa holders in Australia was 30 September 2009 with 434 030 visa holders (Figure 10).

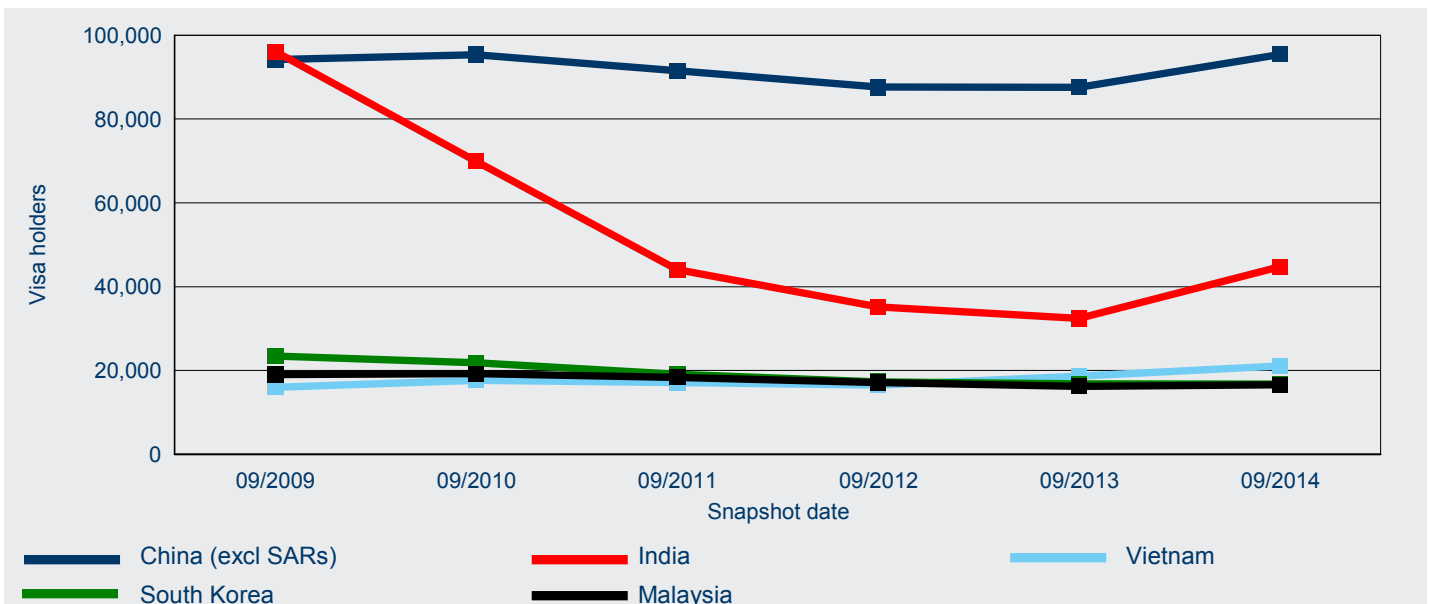
The top source citizenship country for student visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was China (excl SARs) (95 420 visa holders), followed by India (44 790), Vietnam (21 120), South Korea (16 780) and Malaysia (16 620) (Figure 11).

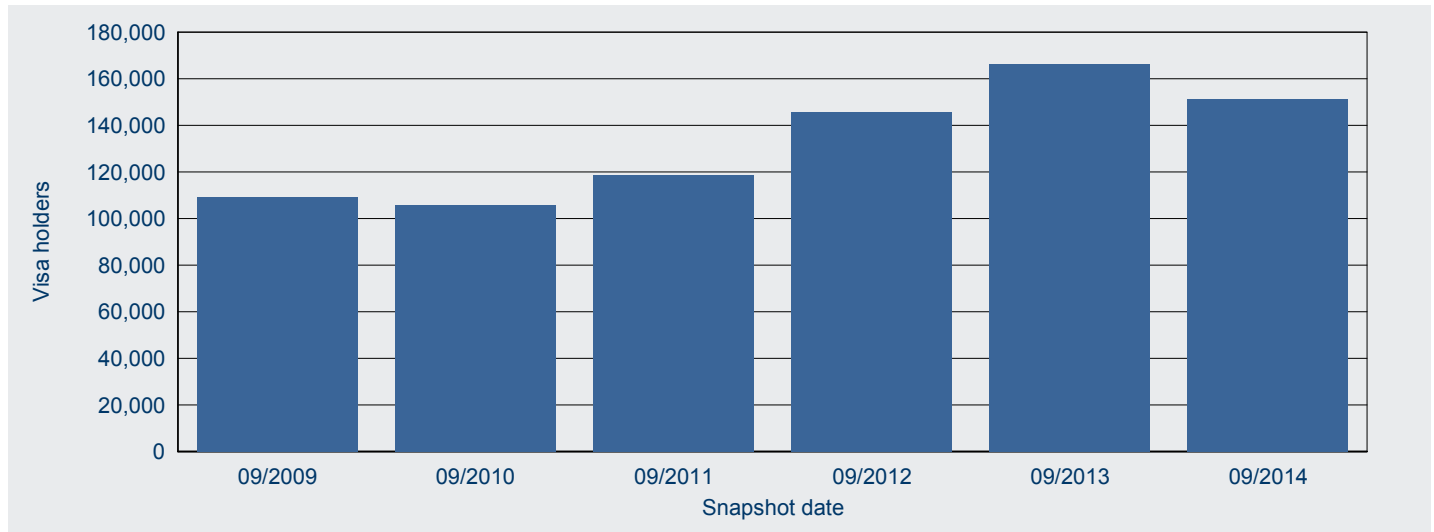
Figure 12: Student visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

When comparing the number of student visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 12 shows that over the past five years, the number of student visa holders from China (excl SARs) increased by 1.3 per cent from 30 September 2009, India decreased by 53.4 per cent, Vietnam increased by 32.0 per cent, South Korea decreased by 28.5 per cent and Malaysia decreased by 12.6 per cent.

## Working holiday maker visa holders

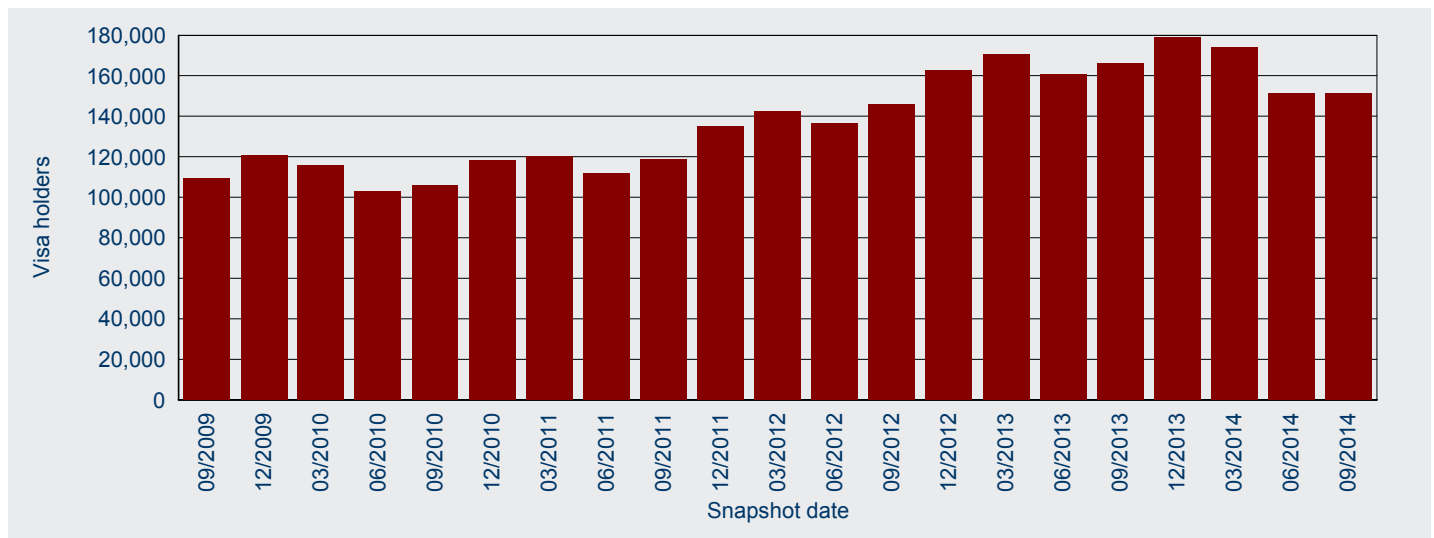
There were 151 220 working holiday maker visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014. This represents a decrease of 9.0 per cent when compared with 166 260 on 30 September 2013 (Figure 13).

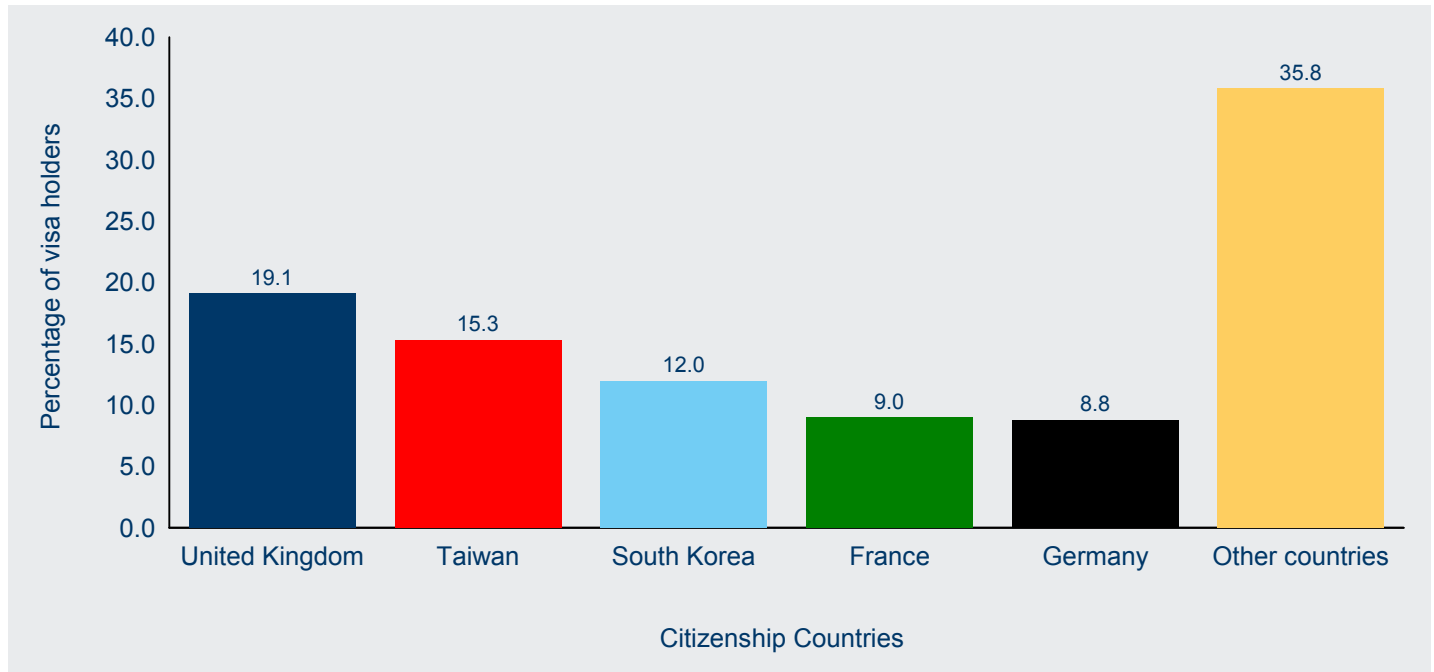
Figure 14: Working holiday maker visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

In the past five years, the quarter with the highest number of working holiday maker visa holders in Australia was 31 December 2013 with 178 980 visa holders (Figure 14).

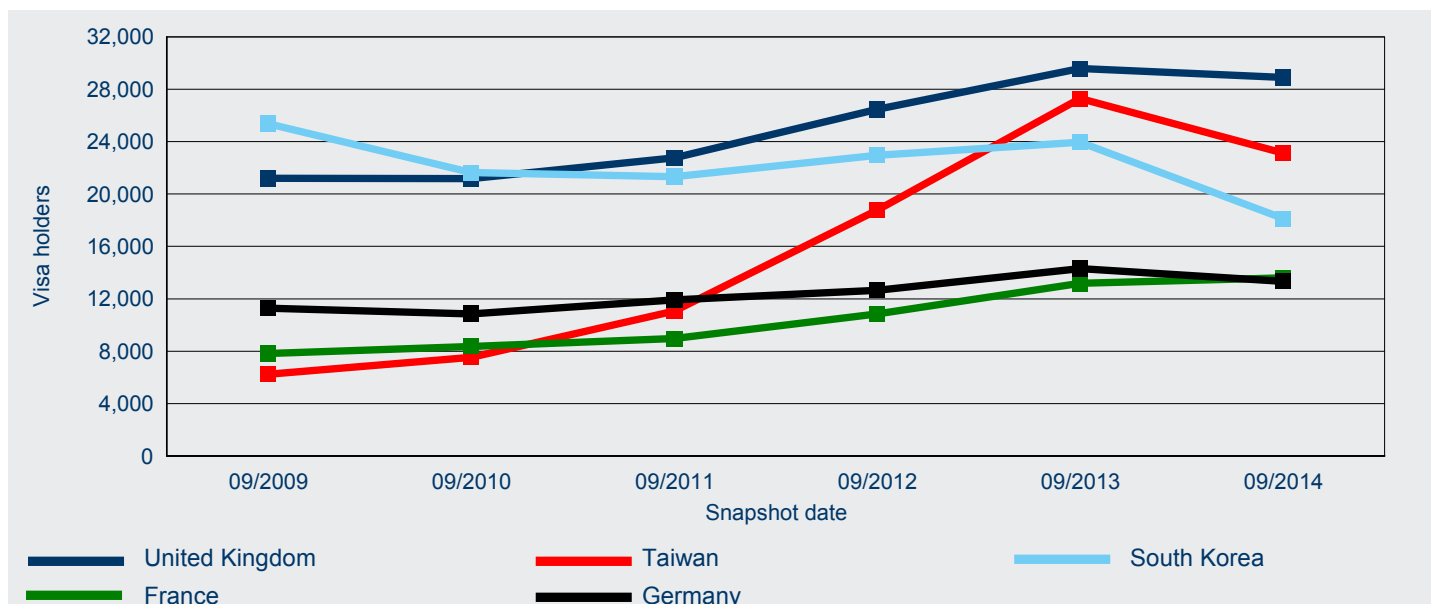
The top source citizenship country for working holiday maker visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was United Kingdom (28 890 visa holders), followed by Taiwan (23 120), South Korea (18 130), France (13 610) and Germany (13 340) (Figure 15).

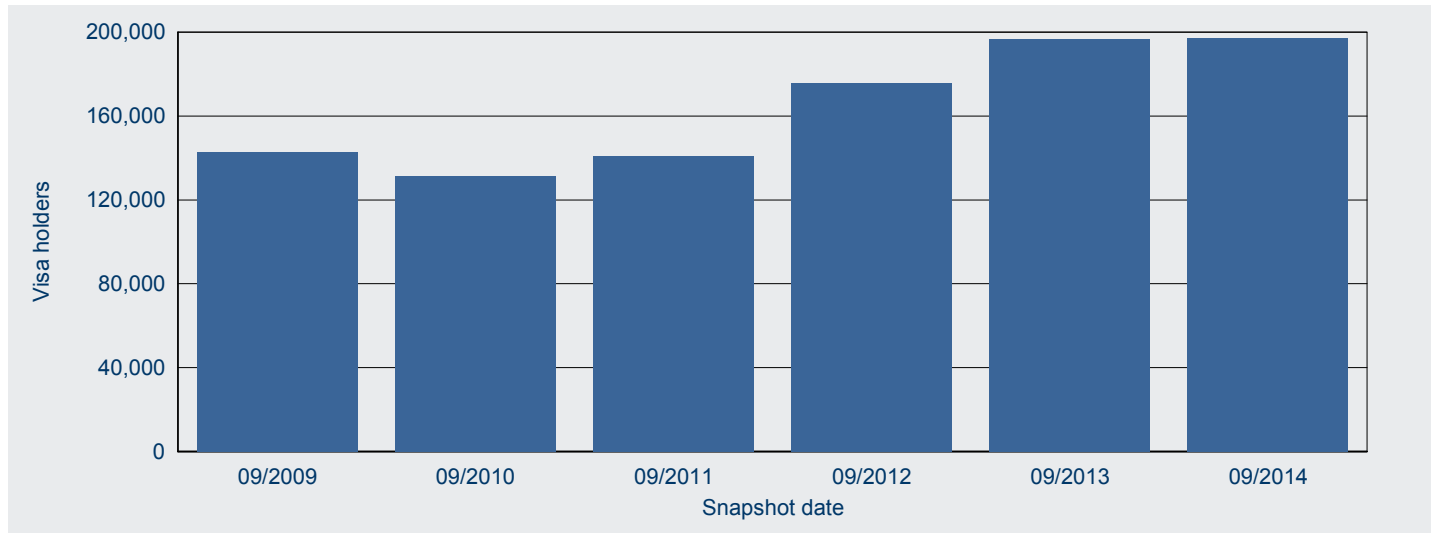
Figure 16: Working Holiday Maker visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

When comparing the number of working holiday maker visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 16 shows that over the past five years, the number of working holiday maker visa holders from United Kingdom increased by 36.2 per cent from 30 September 2009, Taiwan increased by 270.3 per cent, South Korea decreased by 28.5 per cent, France increased by 74.1 per cent and Germany increased by 18.1 per cent.

## Temporary skilled visa holders

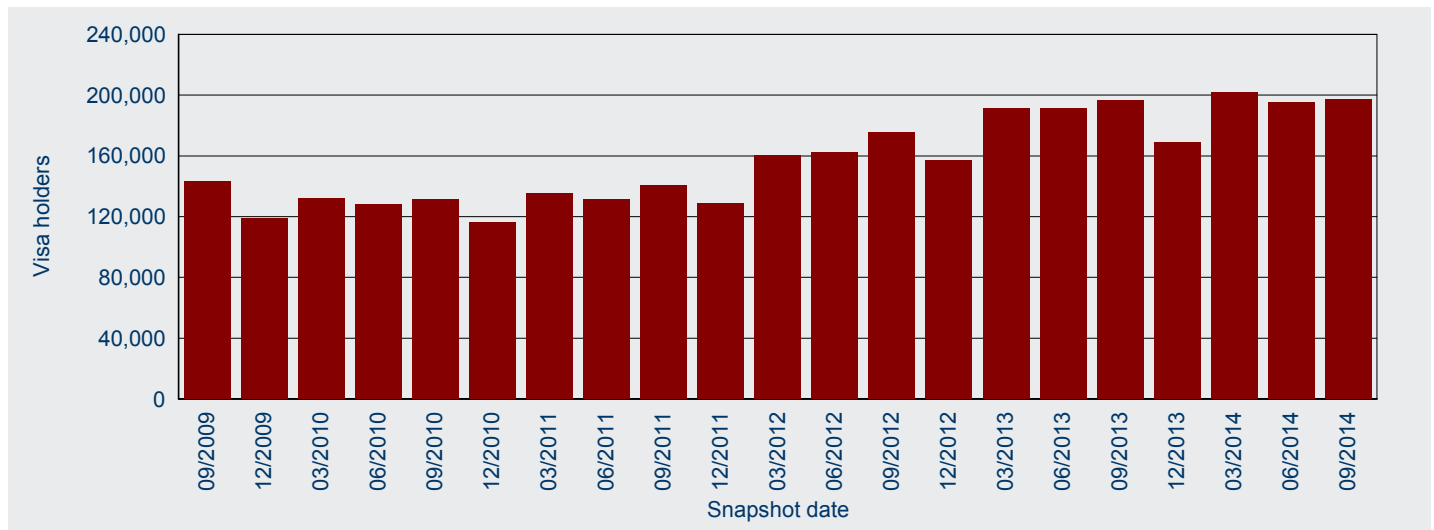

Figure 18: Temporary skilled visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

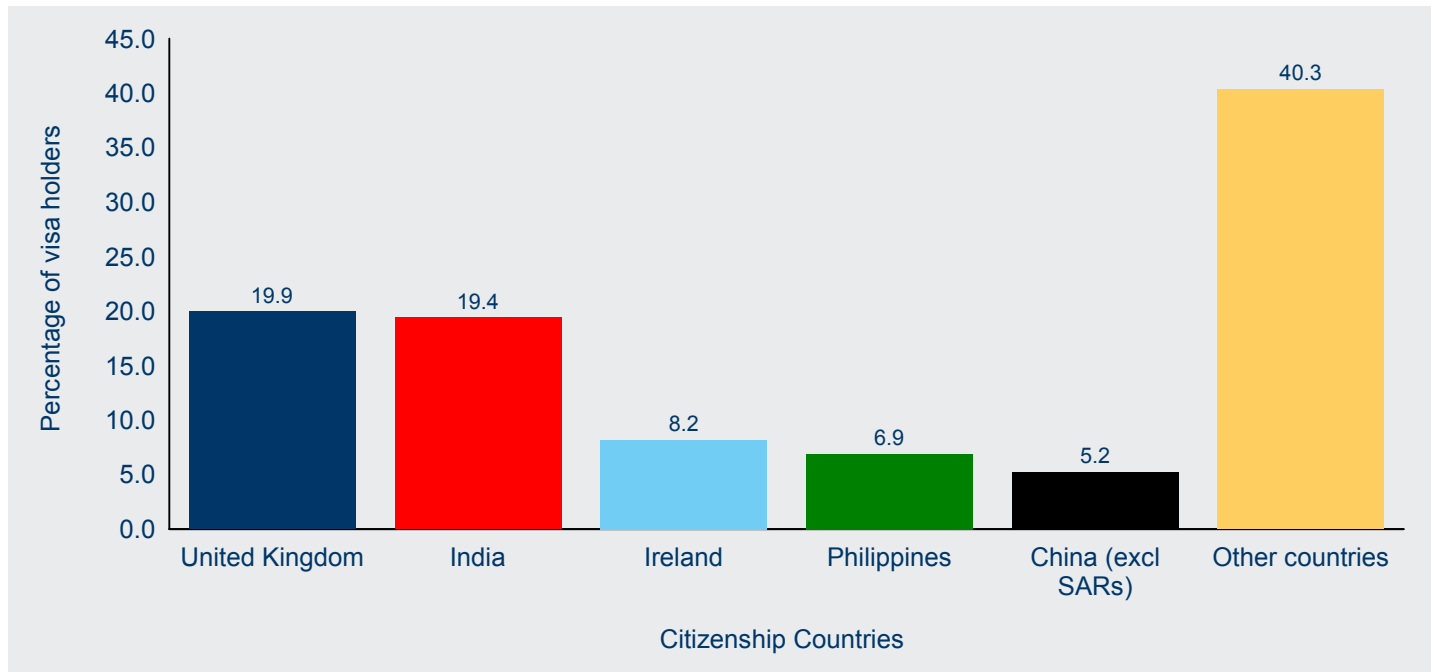

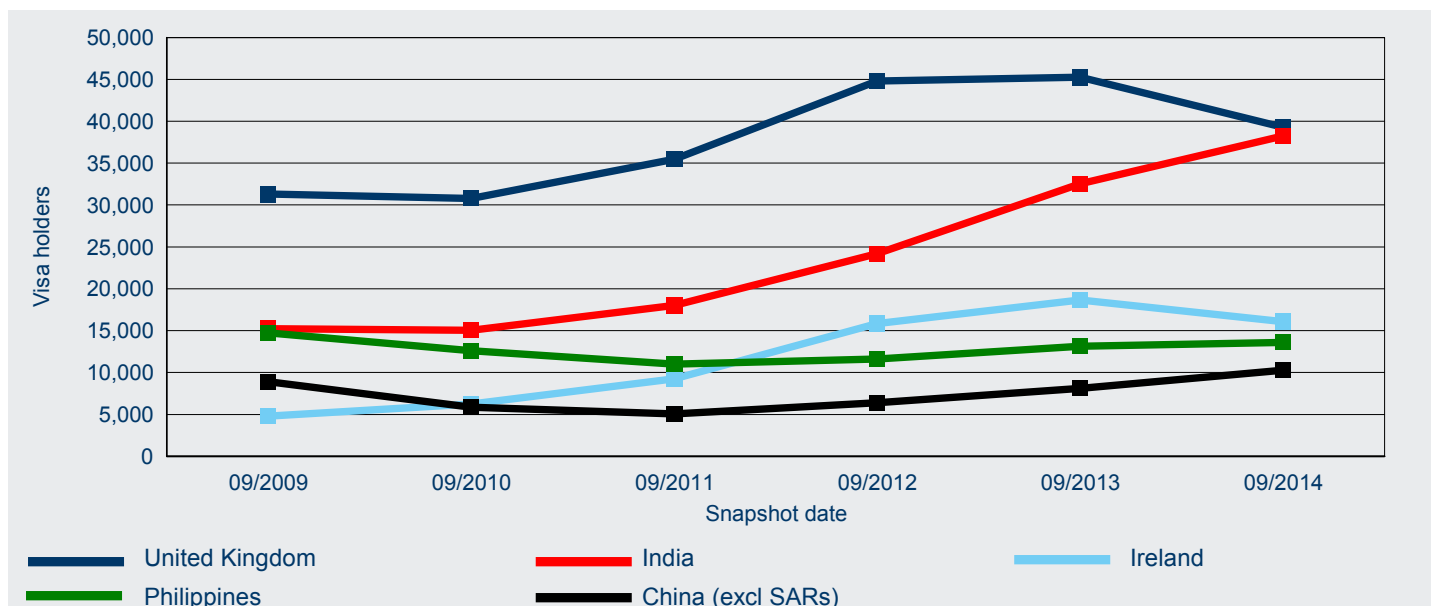

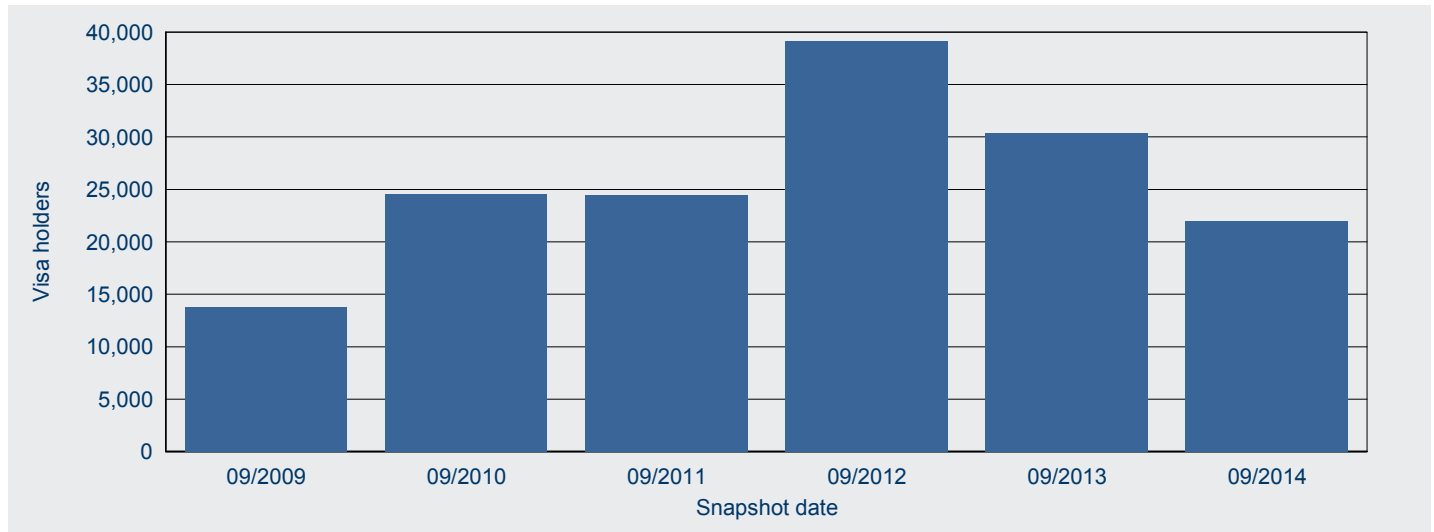
Figure 20: Temporary skilled visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

When comparing the number of temporary skilled visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 20 shows that over the past five years, the number of temporary skilled visa holders from United Kingdom increased by 25.5 per cent from 30 September 2009, India increased by 151.4 per cent, Ireland increased by 236.4 per cent, Philippines decreased by 7.9 per cent and China (excl SARs) increased by 15.6 per cent.

## Temporary graduate visa holders

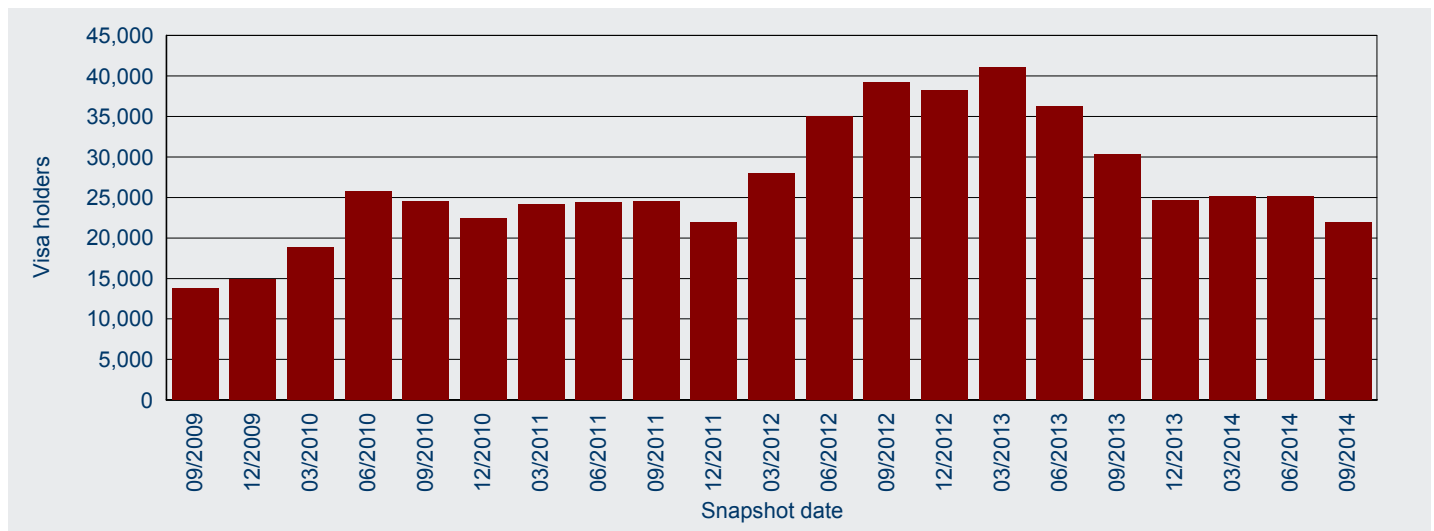

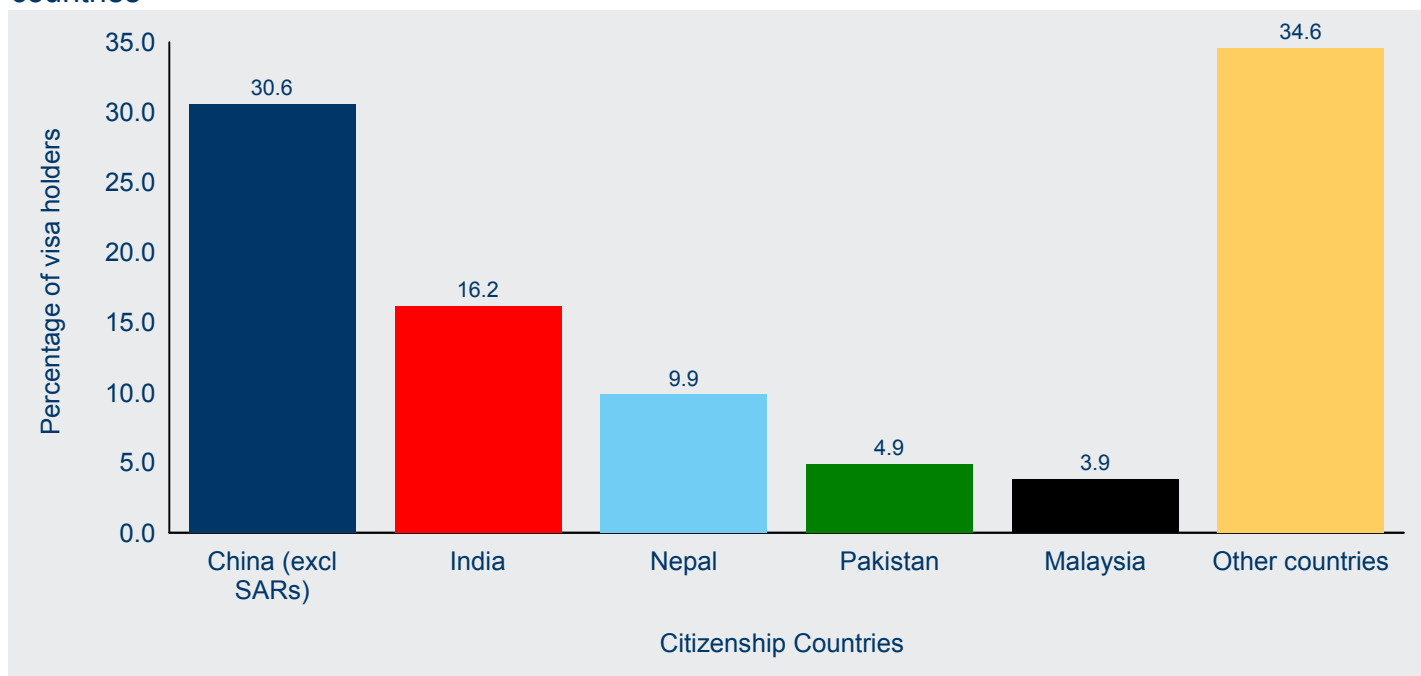
Figure 22: Temporary graduate visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

In the past five years, the quarter with the highest number of temporary graduate visa holders in Australia was 31 March 2013 with 41 090 visa holders (Figure 22).

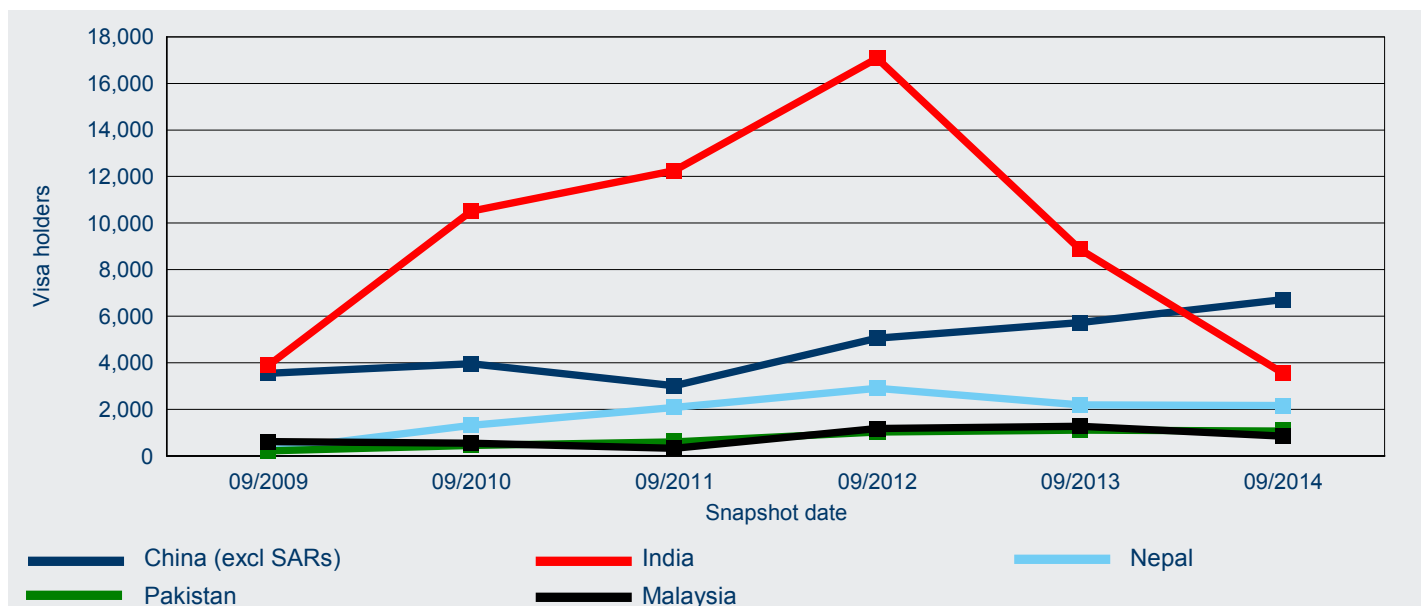
The top source citizenship country for temporary graduate visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 was China (excl SARs) (6 720 visa holders), followed by India (3 550), Nepal (2 170), Pakistan (1 080) and Malaysia (850) (Figure 23)

When comparing the number of temporary graduate visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 24 shows that over the past two years, the number of temporary graduate visa holders from China (excl SARs) increased by 32.7 per cent from 30 September 2012, India decreased by 79.2 per cent, Nepal decreased by 25.6 per cent, Pakistan increased by 5.0 per cent and Malaysia decreased by 27.9 per cent.

Figure 24: Temporary graduate visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend



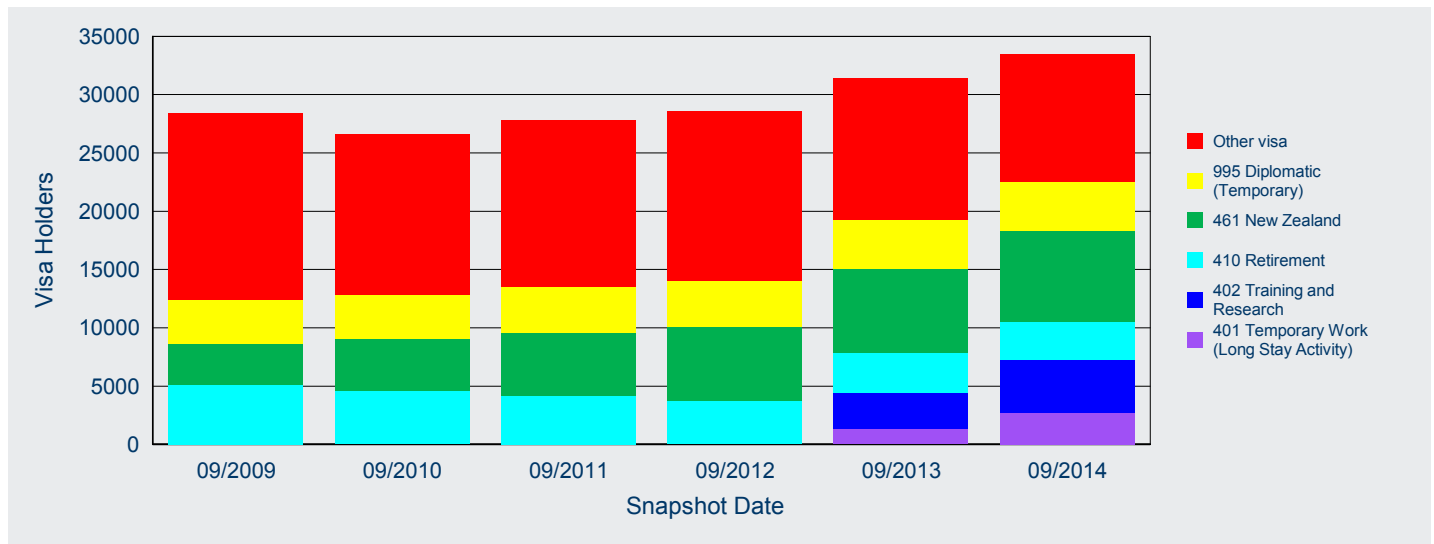
## Other temporary visa holders

- 401 Temporary Work (Long Stay Activity)

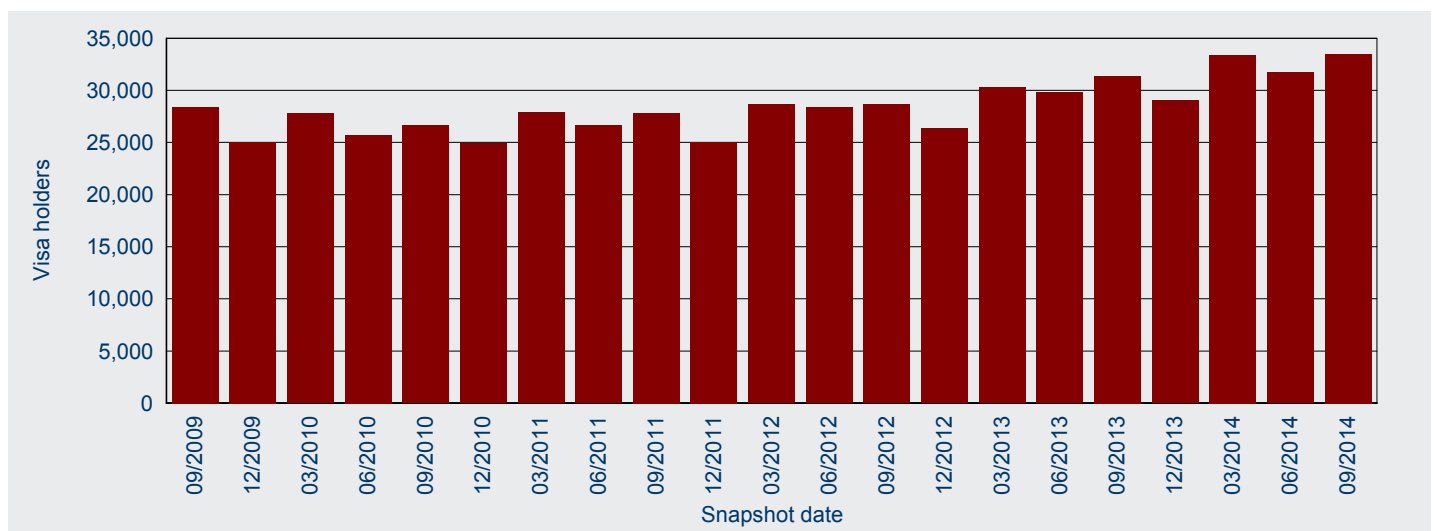

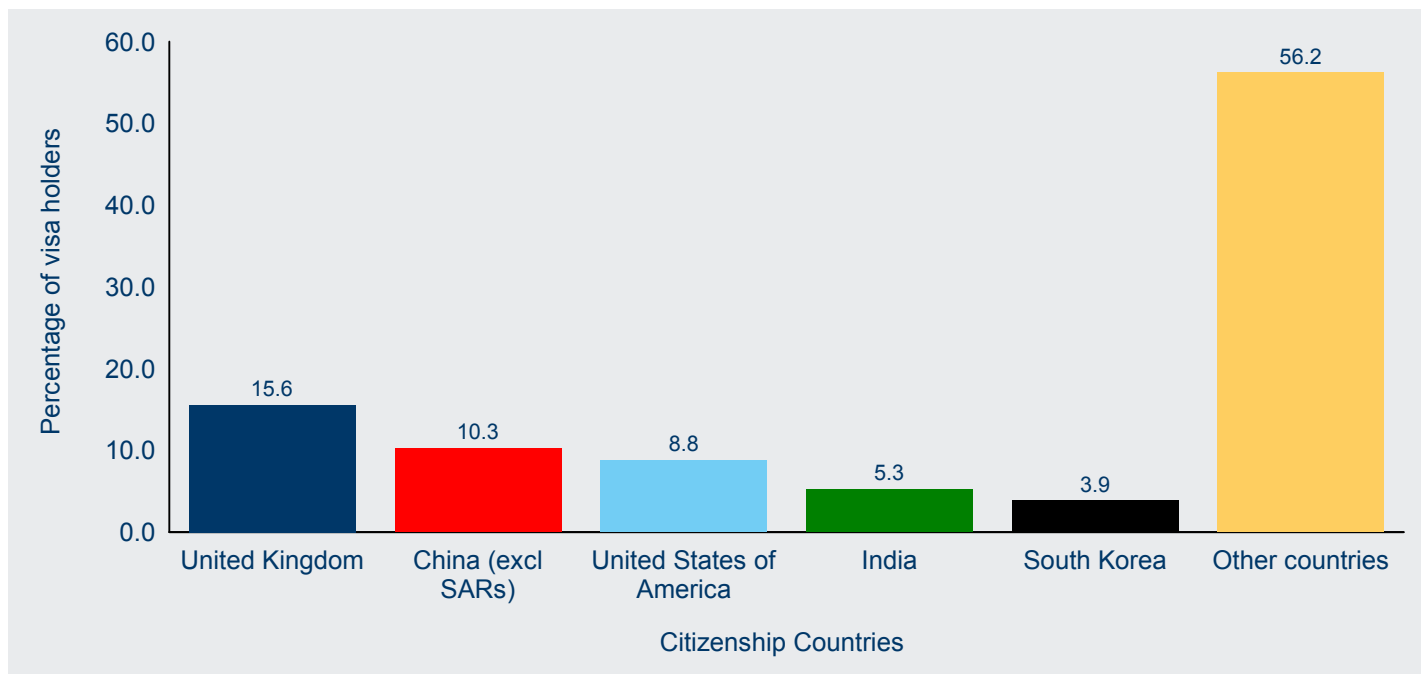
Figure 26: Other temporary visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

In the past five years, the quarter with the highest number of other temporary visa holders in Australia was 30 September 2014 with 33 510 visa holders (Figure 26).

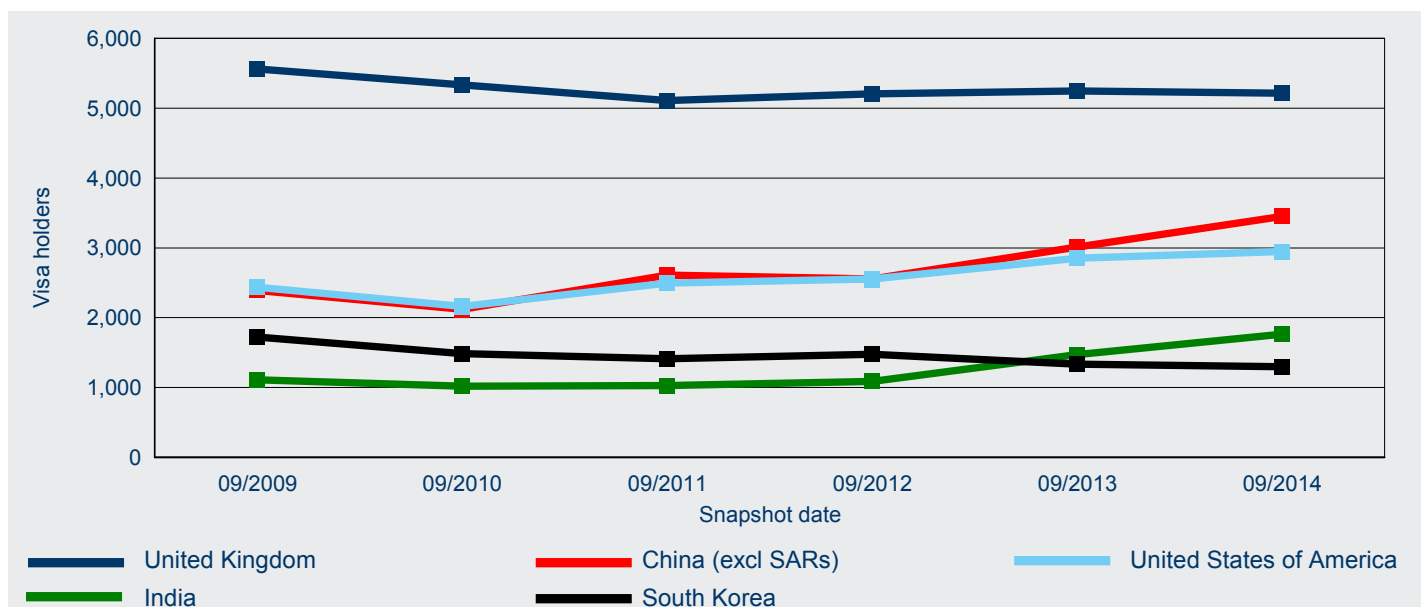

When comparing the number of other temporary visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 24 shows that over the past five years, the number of other temporary visa holders from United Kingdom decreased by 6.3 per cent from 30 September 2009, China (excl SARs) increased by 44.3 per cent, United States of America increased by 21.0 per cent, India increased by 58.7 per cent and South Korea decreased by 24.6 per cent.

Figure 28: Other temporary visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

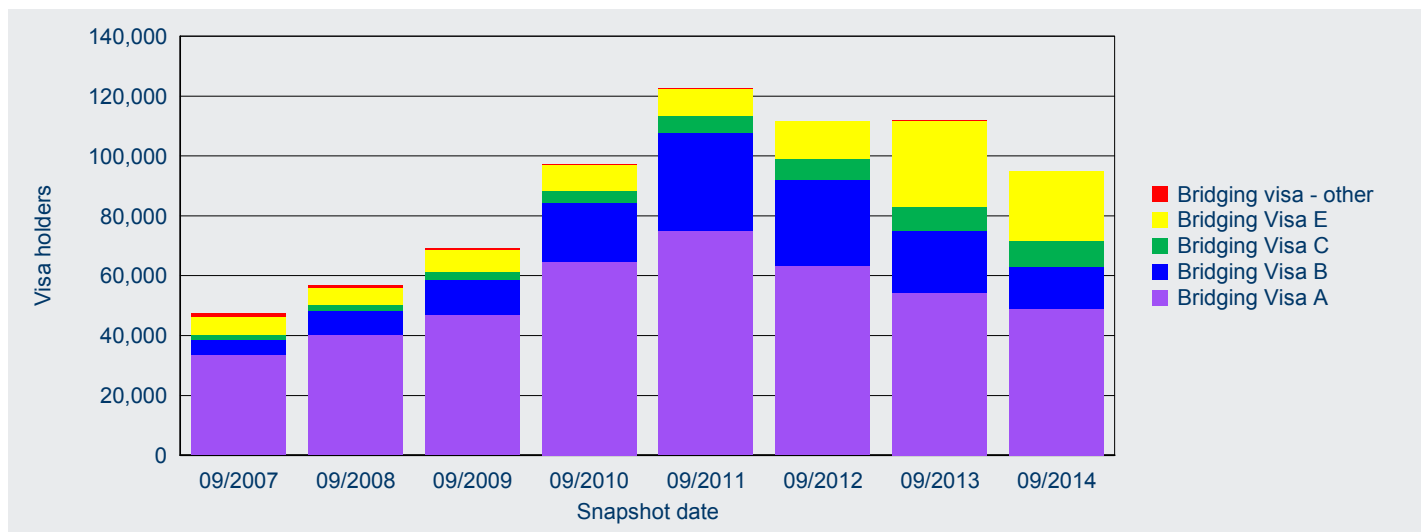


## Bridging visa holders

Bridging visas provide lawful status to certain non-citizens who would otherwise be unlawful and therefore liable to be detained under the *Migration Act 1958*. Bridging visa A is granted to non-citizens who have had a substantive visa and who have made a valid application for a further substantive visa. Bridging visa B is granted to Bridging visa A holders who demonstrate substantial reasons for travel. Bridging visa C is granted to applicants who do not hold a substantive visa when they apply for a substantive visa while in Australia. Bridging visa E is granted to certain unlawful non-citizens in circumstances of compliance interest, including those who are making arrangements to depart Australia. Other Bridging visa classes are granted to non-citizens under other specific circumstances.

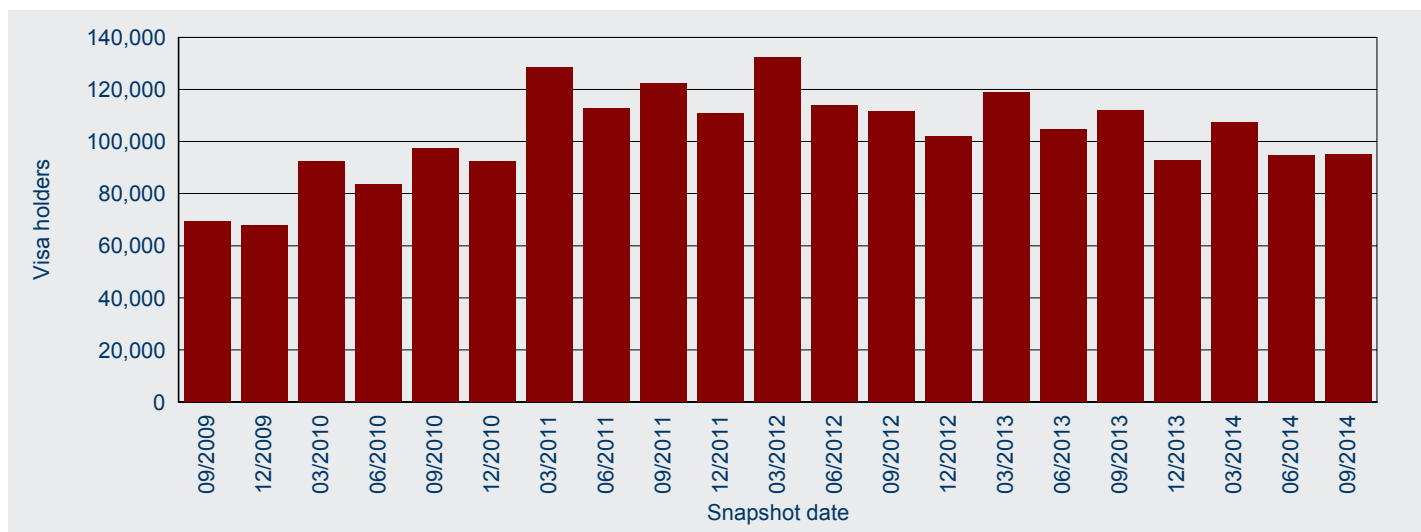
There were 94 840 bridging visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014. This represents a decrease of 15.3 per cent when compared with 111 980 on 30 September 2013 (Figure 29).

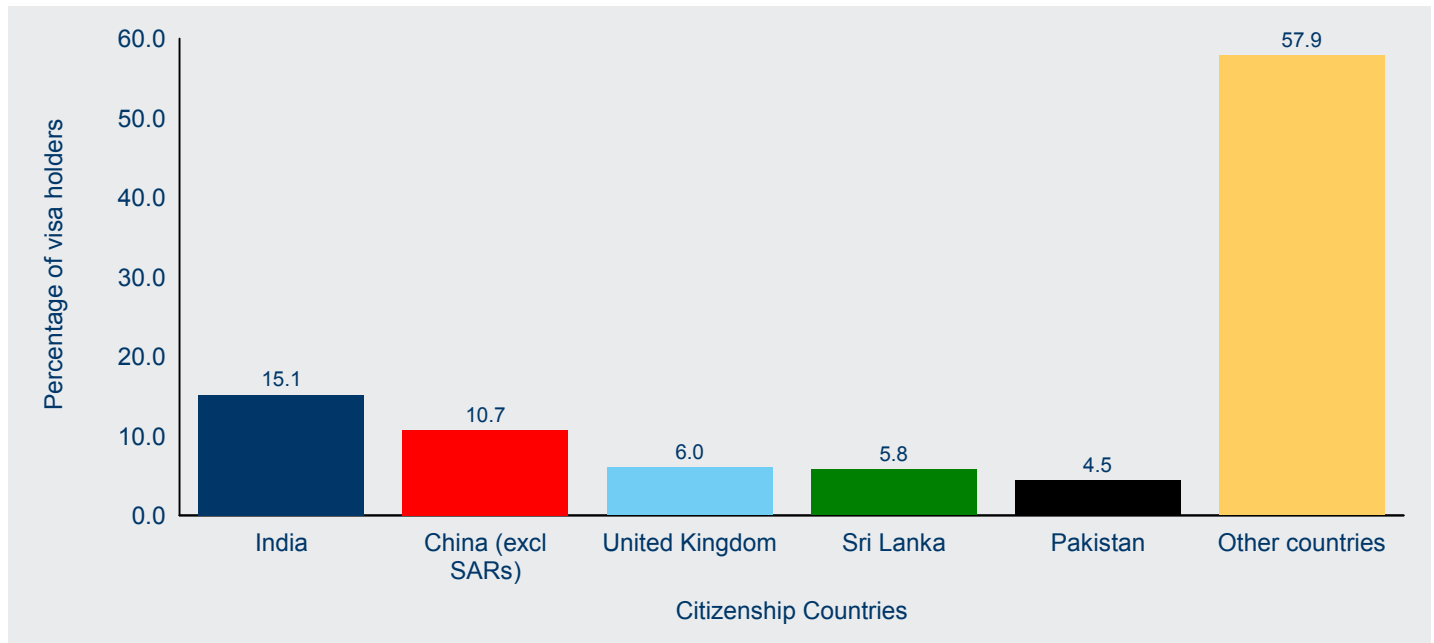
Figure 30: Bridging visa holders in Australia - quarterly historical series

In the past five years, the quarter with the highest number of bridging visa holders in Australia was 31 March 2012 with 132 320 visa holders (Figure 30).

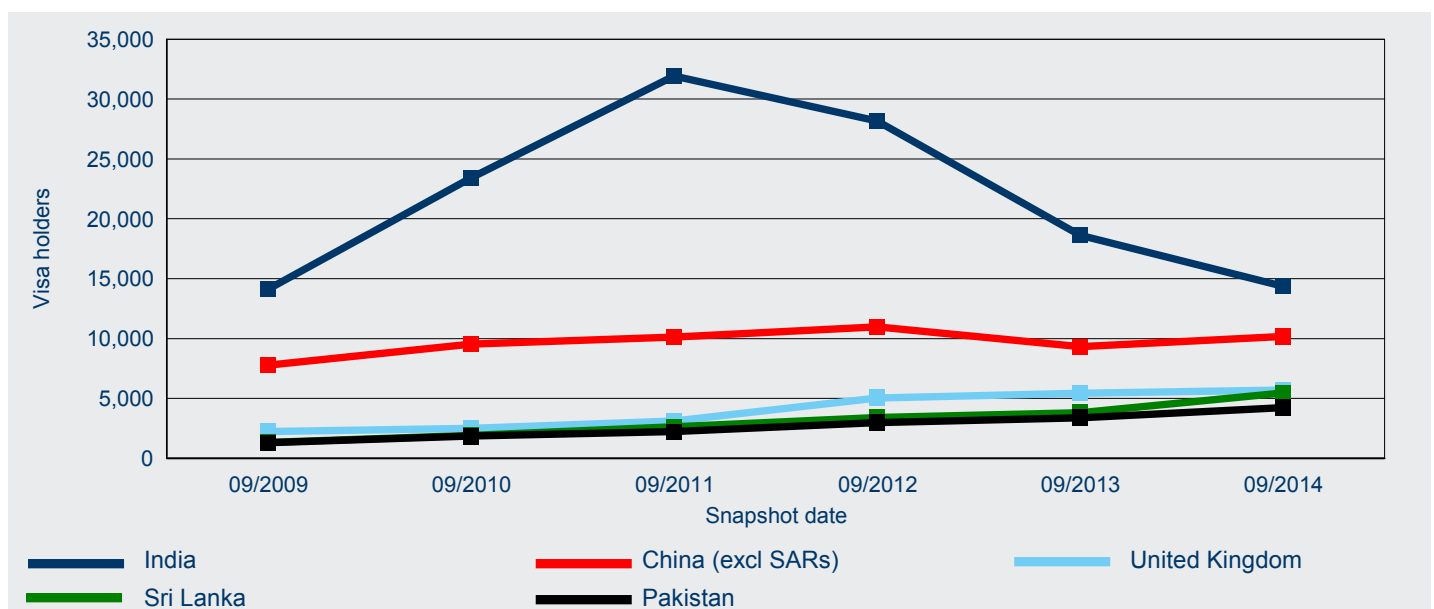

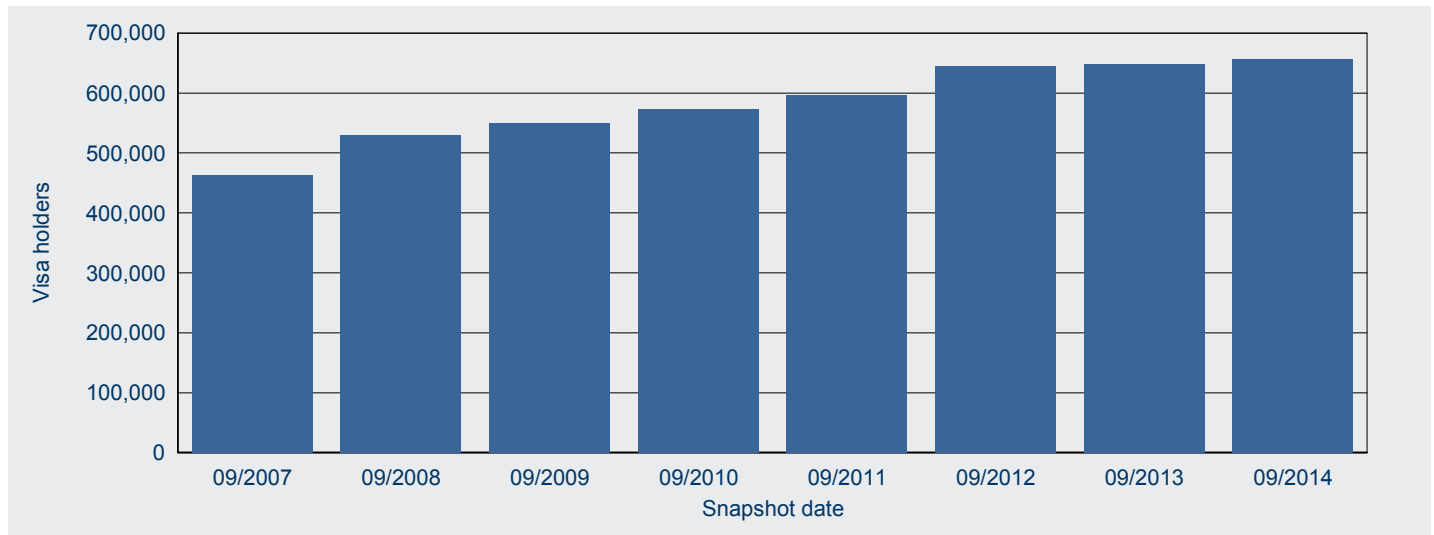
Figure 32: Bridging visa holders in Australia - top five citizenship countries trend

When comparing the number of bridging visa holders in Australia on 30 September 2014 with earlier years, Figure 32 shows that over the past five years, the number of bridging visa holders from India increased by 1.7 per cent from 30 September 2009, China (excl SARs) increased by 31.0 per cent, United Kingdom increased by 154.0 per cent, Sri Lanka increased by 312.2 per cent and Pakistan increased by 222.9 per cent.

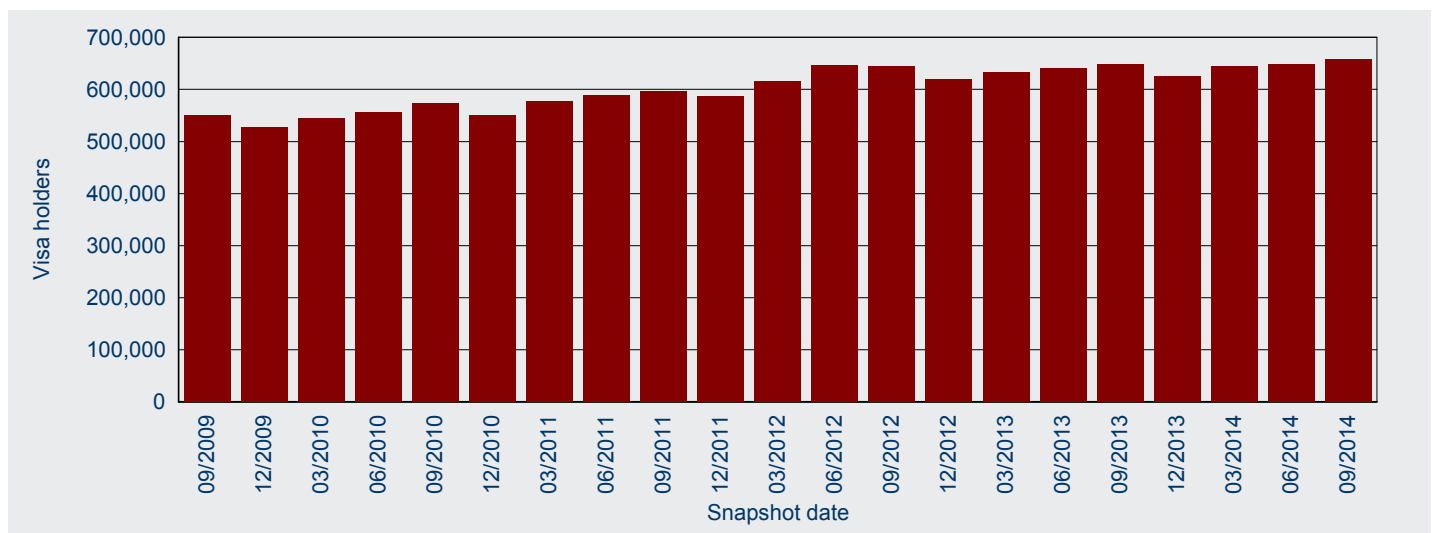
