## Pathways to permanent residence

In the 2017-18 program year to 31 December 2017:

- 18,540 subclass 457 visa holders were granted permanent residence or a provisional visa, a decrease of 24.6 per cent compared with the same period in the previous program year (24,600);
- the vast majority of permanent visa grants to subclass 457 visa holders were in the economic migration stream (96.9 per cent), with the remaining permanent visa grants in the family stream (3.1 per cent).
