The Temporary Skill Shortage (TSS) (subclass 482) visa program came into effect on 18 March 2018, at which time the Temporary (Work) Skilled (subclass 457) visa program ceased for new applications. The data in this report covers both visas.

The size of the program

During this reporting period, the size of the overall TSS (and residual subclass 457 visa) program has decreased when compared with the same period last program year as indicated in the table below.

Pathways to permanent residence

In the 2022-23 program year to 31 December 2022:

- 15,600 temporary resident (skilled) visa holders were granted permanent residence or a provisional visa, an increase of 26.6 per cent compared with the same period in the previous program year (12,320);
- the vast majority of permanent visa grants to TSS and subclass 457 visa holders were in the economic migration stream (64.4 per cent).
